

- a) The vision and mission statements of the college are clearly indicative of the objectivities of the national policy on education demanding that centres of higher education should perform multiple roles like creating new knowledge, acquiring new capabilities and producing an intelligent human resource pool, through challenging teaching, research and extension activities.

New academic programs have been initiated keeping in mind their growing demand in the market. Co-curricular and extra-curricular activities are executed through various departments to shape the values are inculcated among students through NSS, NCC and other extension activities.

- Frequent unit tests are conducted for the overall improvement of the students.
- Special guidance to present answers in the examinations is provided.

6.3.4 Research and Development

College has Research Recommendation Cell which promotes the research activities in the college. The remaining faculty and the departments have planned to submit their minor and major research projects during academic year 2013-14 to the UGC, New Delhi. All the departments are maintaining the quality of research and are well connected with Shivaji University, Kolhapur for knowledge sharing.

6.3.5 Library, ICT and physical infrastructure / instrumentation

The college has separate library building which contains more than 72,200 books including reference books and text books. The Computer laboratory has more than 60 computers for better use of ICT in the academic as well as for administration. The building has 23 classrooms and 13 laboratories, athletic track, kho-kho ground, Kabaddi ground etc. All the laboratories are well equipped. Laboratories of Physics, Chemistry, Botany, and Zoology were ready to apply for recognition as a research laboratories for M.Phil/Ph.D. by university. The college is trying to computerize the library and office during the next academic year

6.3.6 Human Resource Management

College has few vacant posts of teaching and non-teaching faculty, but existing faculty members are utilising for their full strength along with few temporary faculty members. Total 39 temporary teaching staff were appointed by the management along with 5 non teaching staff.

6.3.7 Faculty and Staff recruitment

Due to the policy of State Govt. There are constraints in filling the teaching and non teaching vacant posts. Management has taken the decision to fill up the vacancies of teaching staff by papers following the procedure of University norms and State Government rules.

College has approached some industries for collaboration. The college has signed several MOUs with some research centres and govt departments.
