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#### **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

Padmabhushan Dr. Vasantraodada Patil Mahavidyalaya, Tasagaon (Dist.Sangli) was established in 1962 by Shri Swami Vivekanand Shikshan Sanstha, Kolhapur founded by Shikshanmaharshi Dr. Bapuji Salunkhe with a motto—Dissemination of Education for Knowledge, Science and Culture. The college is located in the prime area of the city having pleasant and healthy atmosphere. Presently, the strength of the senior college is 3850. The total number of teaching and non-teaching staff is 104 and 27 respectively, and the student teacher ratio is 37:1. The college is reaccredited with 'B' grade by NAAC with CGPA 2.09 in February 2010. The college is recognized as one of the best colleges in the Shivaji University, Kolhapur, not only for academic achievements but also for achievements in the fields of research, sports, cultural, and extension activities.

The college offers a wide range of conventional programme options in B.A., B.Com., B.Sc. along with the self-supported professional courses like BCA, and M.Sc.(Org. Chem.) and M.A.(Marathi, Hindi, English and Economics). During the last five years, the college has introduced 04 UGC funded and 02 self-financed career oriented/skill/development courses. The college also runs the programmes in distance mode like B.A.,B.Com., MBA, of Yashwantrao Chavan Open University (YCMOU), Nasik and B.A., B.Com., M.A. of Shivaji University, Kolhapur. Keeping in view, the need of creating entrepreneurial skills among the students, the college has recently started need-oriented short term courses in Computer Programming, Fashion Designing, Driving School for Light Motor Vehicles with the kind support of Shivaji University, Kolhapur and Govt. of Maharashtra under the title 'YUVAJAGAR'.

During the last five year, the college has organized 03 national-level and 01 state-level UGC funded seminars/conferences of subjects of Geography, Chemistry & Life Sciences, Political Science, Economics. The college has also organized state-level NAAC funded conference on 'Role of Research Consultancy & Extension In Higher Education' funded by UGC. The college has published Proceedings of 03 National and 02 State Level Seminars/ Conferences/Workshops organized by it.

It's a great pleasure to note that the college is organizing the First International Conference on 'Recent Trends in Science, Management, Engineering and Technology' at Dubai on November 21<sup>st</sup> to 23<sup>rd</sup> 2015 in collaboration with other knowledge partners.

The college has developed a good research culture, and during the last five years 05 Major and 28 Minor Research Projects have been undertaken by the faculty. There are 11 faculties who are guiding 15 M.Phil/Ph.D. students. The faculties have participated in, have been appointed as resource persons, have published and presented their papers at international, national and regional levels in seminars/conferences/workshops. Our faculties have been engaged in researches and have published there work in of high standard journals with high index and impact factors.

As a result, the college has been short-listed by Shivaji University Kolhapur for awarding the status of 'College with Potential for Excellence' (CPE) by the UGC. The College has full hope for getting the CPE. At the same time the Department of Science and Technology (DST) has sanctioned a grant of Rs. 50,00,000/- for the college under FIST Programme.

Our students undertake work of research projects and they have completed various research projects. The students also participate in the AVISHKAR activity conducted by Shivaji University, Kolhapur. The college is trying to prepare the students for research of global standard. Keeping in mind the same perspective, the college is running a very unique and innovative research-based program for students called 'NEW HORIZON' for the last four years. Every year more than 100 original research articles have been presented in the program.

The college publishes its news bulletin twice in a year entitled 'MY COLLEGE BULLETIN' to publicize the college activities. The students of our college have a potential of writing skills. For the last two years the students of Arts faculty have been publishing on

special moments a Marathi bulletin 'YUVA SPANDAN' and 'YUVA AVISHKAR' occasionally. For the last many years some of the science departments have been publishing annual compendium as CHEMVISION regularly of all the activities taking place in the year. Our faculty Prof. G. K. Patil (History) has been writing articles regularly in news papers and has published more than 150 timely articles till this day. Our faculty from Marathi department Prof. B. K. Gosavi is engaged in writing songs and scripts for Marathi feature films which are well acknowledged. For quality enhancement, the college provides free internet access and other teaching-learning resources to the students and teachers. The central library of the college is partly computerized with Slim 21 software and OPAC system, and provides INFLIBNET facility to have access to e-resources. The college has 12 MOUs/collaborations/linkages with various renowned agencies like IIT Mumbai and Vishwashanti Multipurpose Society of Maharashtra which help us in quality enhancement as well as placements of the students.

The college participates in various 39 sports events as per All India Inter Universities Sports programmes. Every year the college produces many national-level/inter-university level sports persons.

The NSS department of the college is one of the best departments in the university having received several awards at the district, university and state levels.

The NCC unit of the college is the most active unit in Kolhapur NCC Group. 02 NCC cadets of the college were selected for the Republic Day (RD) Parade, Delhi in 2015. 08 cadets were selected for National Integration Camps, 03 cadets were National Treks. 03 NCC cadets have been selected as Army Officers in Defence Services and many in police department during the last five years. 188 cadets have participated in the State-level NCC camps.

To encourage and motivate the students, the college gives cash prizes, kits, and financial assistance to the meritorious student in academic and other activities at the grand annual prize-distribution ceremony. The teaching and non-teaching staffs are felicitated for their achievements in the meetings with the managements on the Independence and Republic Days and also at the annual prize-distribution ceremony.

The Govt. of Maharashtra launched a gender sensitization programme entitled Jagar Janivancha for women empowerment. Our college is very sensitive about this programme and has conducted many training and awareness programs for the female students.

The college has been making conscious efforts to create environmental awareness among the students. A number of initiatives have been taken to promote the concept of reduce, reuse, recycle, and thus contribute to protecting the environment. The college has made Environment Carbon Audit of its campus by the available expertise in the department of Botany. The college undertakes various activities related to environment awareness in and outside the college. The college has not only undertaken a plantation drive in and outside the college campus, but also taken care of the plantation afterwards. Today it has given nice results with tall and diverse trees.

Many of the students are giving outstanding performances by achieving the prestigious awards like INSPIRE, DUNN HILL.

The Placement Cell of the college is very active, and during the last five year many students have been placed in various organizations through campus interviews. The college volunteers for evaluation of its academic and administrative performance periodically by internal and external agencies besides self-evaluation. Academic and Administrative Audit (AAA) of the college is done by the panel of external peers of our parent management by giving on-site visit and interacting with the stakeholders. The evaluative report based on SWOC analysis of the panel is submitted to the Principal. This has been one of the best practices undertaken by the parent management and the college since 2010-11.

Though the college has so many strengths, there are certain weaknesses like increasing number of temporary faculty due to the policy of State Govt. The policy of the

State Govt. to sanction new courses only on no Non-Grant basis is a hurdle in the academic growth of the college.

The college has still opportunities to attain excellence in curricular, research, and other activities. So we think that the college has an opportunity to get the further Excellence by securing CGPA above 3 in the 3rd Cycle of accreditation by the NAAC. The college is willing to introduce more PG courses as M.Sc. in the subjects like Physics, Botany, Zoology, Mathematics and Statistics and also to organize International seminars/conference, to increase research activities, and to seek funding from various agencies.

The college has still certain challenges to face like increasing demands for admission. To establish Common Facility Centre in the college.

- Education to inculcate cultural values into the students and to make them better citizens of India with vision and values.
- To ensure values like truth, honesty, character, sacrifice into the students and to prevent social exploitation through education.
- To aim at overall personality development through extracurricular activities.
- To attain community and social development through various activities.
- To provide a platform to the students to enhance their skills/potentials as well as a sense of social responsibility and nationality through sports, cultural activities, NCC, NSS, COCs, etc.
- To train and coach the students to face competitive examinations.
- To help the students for on-the-job training and placements.
- (a) The vision and mission statements of the college are clearly indicative of the objectives of the National Policy on Education demanding that centers of higher education should perform multiple roles like creating new knowledge, acquiring new capabilities and producing an intelligent human resource pool, through challenging teaching, research and extension activities.
- **(b)** Translation of vision statement into activities:

The college plans and executes its curricular, co-curricular, extracurricular activities to translate the vision and mission statements into reality.

New academic programmes have been initiated keeping in mind their growing demand in the market. Co-curricular and extracurricular activities are executed through various departments to shape the personality of the students. Cultural and social values are inculcated among the students through NCC, NSS and other extension activities.

We communicate our vision and mission to all stakeholders through college website, college prospectus, advertisements, Alumni's and Parents' Meetings, and special notice boards at prime locations of the college.

- 1.1.2 How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s)
- **1.** As the college is affiliated to Shivaji University, Kolhapur, it follows the University designed curriculum. The college operates at UG & PG levels keeping in mind our goals and objectives, that is to make students employable through holistic education and skill development.
- **2**. The University prepares an Academic Calendar that specifies the duration of the semester, the date of commencement and the end of the semesters.
- 3. In the beginning of the academic year, an action plan is prepared by the IQAC. Separte time tables for Arts, Commerce, Science and other programmes are prepared. In tune with the changes of syllabi made by the University, the college procures required number of books and research journals in the Central Library. The students on request, have free access to the library. Most of the departments have their own computers with internet connectivity.

- **4**. Teachers are encouraged to use ICT in classes. The Head of the Department in departmental meeting assigns each faculty member a particular portion of the curriculum for teaching. Teachers frame a teaching plan according to the given framework of time, and proceed for the implementation of curriculum accordingly. If there are constraints to complete the curriculum, extra classes are conducted. At the end of each academic session, the students have to appear for semester examinations.
- **5**. Each department conducts class tests for internal assessment. The use of ICT, Laptop, well-equipped laboratories facilitates the students to improve their performance. Each department organizes seminars, workshops and lectures of experts in the concerned subjects. The college also motivates the students to bring out various issues of wall papers.

## 1.1.3 What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

College faculties receive all the needed support for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices. They are as follows:

- **a)** To translate the curriculum effectively, teachers are provided with syllabi, academic calendar, and academic diaries, and are encouraged to use various teaching aids. Whenever syllabus is revised, the concerned faculties of the subjects are deputed to attend the workshops. The separate budgetary provision is made to encourage teachers to participate in seminars, conferences and workshops.
- **b)** The college deputes the faculties for the Faculty Improvement Programmes and Quality Improvement Programmes conducted by the university and other institutions and agencies. The faculties deputed attend Orientation/Refresher courses, and summer schools to update their knowledge.
- **c**) The college also organizes seminars, conferences, workshops for the benefit of the teachers and students.
- **d)** A multi-disciplinary compilations entitled **YUVA SPANDAN** and **YUVA AVISHKAR** are published to inculcate and promote creative writing skills and promote research culture among the faculties and students. The faculties are also encouraged to publish articles in journals of national and international repute.
- **e**) The college provides library and e-learning facilities (INFLIBNET) to the faculties to effectively deliver the curriculum.
- **f**) The college undertakes upgradation of laboratories from time to time.
- **g**) Students' 'feedback on teachers' performance and curriculum is collected to make teaching-learning more effective. The Principal gives necessary instructions to the individual teacher after analysis of the feedback.
- **h)** The faculties are also encouraged to undertake research activities by providing them necessary assistance.

## 1.1.4 Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other statutory agency.

The college follows the curriculum and academic calendar designed by Shivaji University. The management gives full support and freedom to the institution for effective curriculeum delivery and transaction on them. The progress is regularly monitored by the Heads of the Departments to facilitate effective curriculum delivery and transaction of the curriculum provided by the university. Computer and internet access is also provided to all departments so that faculty members can keep themselves updated in their respective subjects/courses offered, and they have been updated and made relevant in consonance with the curriculum (both theoretical and practical components) which ensure the development of practical skills based on theoretical knowledge. The library services are also provided in the central library through addition of textbooks, reference books, journals, e-journals, etc. made available in the library as per the demands of the faculties as well as the students.

Problem solving exercises, field visits, case studies, surveys and excursions including industrial visits, hands on experience and project works ensure skill development in relevant subject areas of study.

### 1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalization of the curriculum?

The college networks and interacts with the stakeholders from industry, research institutes and the university in effective operationalization of the curriculum. The Local Managing Committee includes experts from the society, who ensure effective implementation of the curriculum. Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)includes experts from the industry. The faculties of the college who work on the university authorities also contribute to the networking and interacting with the beneficiaries.

#### **Industry**

For quality enhancement, the students are given exposure to the industry. Regular industrial visits are organized by the departments for imparting first hand practical knowledge to them. For this, the college has signed MOUs with various industries.

#### **Placement Cell**

The placement cell of the college has arranged several programs for the counseling of the students regarding their placements in Companies and corporate houses. The placement cell is also communicating with the students regarding campus interviews arranged at other institutes. MOUs are signed with various organizations for better industry interaction. During the last five years, many students have been placed in various departments of State Govt., Central Govt., Armed Forces, and Private Compenies as well as corporate houses. Many of them have started there own business.

#### **Research Bodies**

The college faculties are invited as resource persons on academic and other issues by other agencies. They are also encouraged to take up memberships of professional research bodies, and participate in research activities to further enhance their research capabilities. The students are also motivated to actively participate in seminars, workshops for quality enhancement.

Meetings of Board of Studies help the faculties to keep themselves upgrade of the latest trends in their respective fields. Visits to the university departments and the university central library also help to strengthen networking and interaction. The resource persons from various fields are invited for discussions, workshops and for professional interactions.

Designing and restructuring of courses is done by the affiliating University. The college, however, makes significant contribution in the curriculum design and development through its faculties who are the members of the Boards of Studies and Sub-commitees.

The feedbacks from students and their parents on the desired changes in the curriculum are also obtained. Inputs from alumni and employers are also taken into consideration. The faculties who are on various academic bodies communicate the suggestions/ recommendations to the university for redesigning the curriculum for appropriate and effective inclusion.

Short-term workshops other than those offered by the university are designed keeping in view the growing demands from the stakeholders by inviting the experts in the respective fields.

### 1.1.8 How does institution analyze/ensure that the stated objectives of curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation?

The college has established effective communication with all the stakeholders to ensure that the objectives of the curriculum are achieved in the course of implementation. The college ensures the achievement of the stated objectives of the curriculum through the critical analysis of the examination results, and achievements in placements, sports, cultural and extension activities.

The main mission of the institution is to impart higher education to all the students from the different sector of the society. The college analyzes the results of different examinations (class tests, open book tests, surprise tests, semester exams, other modes of assessment like Group Discussions, Home-Assignments, Seminars, etc.). The college ensures the progess of slow learners as well as advanced learners. The college volunteers for the annual internal "Academic and Adminstrative Audit" by the panel of experts appointed by the management. The feedback from the students, parents, and alumni help in analyzing the outcome of the curriculum being taught. The Principal interacts with the stakeholders individually and seek opinions from them. The feedback is also sought from the suggestions of the students received from the suggestion boxes and the opinions expressed by the students in college functions.

To ensure both knowledge and skill development and to enhance competence among the students, the college offers the following skill development courses:

For confidence-building, the Placement Cell organizes lectures on presentation skills, personality development, communication skills, etc. The NSS and NCC departments of the college organize various community-oriented activities.

Yes, the college offers the self-financed UG & PG degree programmes such as BCA, B.Sc. (Computer Science), Botany, Statistics and M.A. (Hindi, Marathi, English and Economics) & M.Sc. (Org. Chemistry)

#### **Self-financed Programmes:**

**UG Courses-** B.Sc. (Computer Science)

Botany Statistics

PG Courses - M.Sc. (Chemistry)

M.A. (Hindi, Marathi, English and Economics)

These programmes are different from other programmes as regards curriculum which is more application-oriented. Admissions are given on the merit of XII std. at the entry level. The college gives concession to pay the fees in installments. Semester examination pattern is adopted. The teachers are appointed on contract basis or as visiting lecturers. The teachers employed on the contract basis are paid on fixed salary, and the visiting lecturers are paid as per the UGC norms.

## 1.2.5 Does the college provide additional skill oriented programmes, relevant to regional and global employment markets? If yes provide details of such programme and the beneficiaries.

Yes. The college provides skill-oriented programmes like-

- 1) Certificate Course in Travel and Tourism.
- 2) Certificate Course in Functional English.
- 3) Certificate Course in Human Rights Education.
- 4) P.G. Diploma Course in Human Rights Education.

The beneficiaries are from the conventional degree students as well as other desirous of seeking admission for the courses. The fees charged are moderate and affordable.

1.2.6 Does the University provide for the flexibility of combining the conventional face-to-face and Distance Mode of Education for students to choose the courses/combination of their choice? If yes, how does the institution take advantage of such provision for the benefit of students?

Yes. There is a flexibility to choose one regular course and one distance mode course. The college has study centers for Distance Education mode under Shivaji University, Kolhapur and YCMOU University, Nashik.

#### 1.3 Curriculum Enrichment

## 1.3.1 Describe the efforts made by the institution to supplement the University's Curriculum to ensure that the academic programmes and Institution's goals and objectives are integrated?

Many faculties of our college are the members of the Board of Studies and Sub-Committees of Shivaji University, Kolhapur. Thus, they are participating in the development of syllabi of the respective subjects. The programmes taught in the college are in accordance with the goals and objectives of the college. In order to create employability, the career-oriented courses are also conducted in the college. These efforts help to develop all-round performance of the students.

## 1.3.2 What are the efforts made by the institution to enrich and organize the curriculum to enhance the experiences of the students so as to cope with the needs of the dynamic employment market?

Considering the feedback from the students and other stakeholders, the college conducts Courses in English, Travel and Tourism & Human Rights Education. In order to

enrich and organize the experiences of the students, they are encouraged to participate in the seminars, workshops, conferences, etc. To cope up with the dynamic employment market, the college runs skill-based COCs. The field visits, and educational tours are also organized for the students to get firsthand knowledge in the concerned areas.

All these efforts resulted into creating more and more employment opportunities for the students. The students are also guided for State Civil Services examinations at our Competitive Examination Guidance Centre.

## 1.3.3 Enumerate the efforts made by the institution to integrate the cross cutting issues such as Gender, Climate Change, Environmental Education, Human Rights, ICT etc., into the curriculum?

The curriculum of various courses is prescribed by the University. However, the faculties working on Boards of Studies address the cross cutting issues while framing and revising the syllabi. - Free internet service to all stakeholders.
- Computerized administrative block.

### 1.3.4 What are the various value-added courses/enrichment programmes offered to ensure holistic development of students?

#### **Moral and Ethical Values:**

- i) Celebration of Vivekananda Birth Anniversary Week (Vivekananda Jayanti Saptah) every year in which lectures of eminent scholars, book exhibition and various competitions are organized.

By understanding the growing need of skilled human resources, the Govt. of Maharashtra under the youth welfare scheme started an unique employment-centric activity called "YUVA JAGAR." The college has started following courses under this scheme.

### 1.3.5 Citing a few examples enumerate on the extent of use of the feedback from stakeholders in enriching the curriculum?

The college collects feedback from the students, teachers, parents' alumni, industries and employers. The feedbacks are analyzed and the findings are recommended to the Boards of Studies of the university through the faculties of the college who are actively working on the BOS. Some of the faculties have been actively contributing in this process.

Taking into consideration the feedback from the stakeholders, the college has introduced career-oriented/skill-enhancing courses and also started professional courses as well as distance mode academic programmes. The curriculum of most of the COCs and some professional courses has been designed by the college teachers and the professionals from the concerned fields.

### 1.3.6 How does the institution monitor and evaluate the quality of its enrichment programmes?

The mechanism developed by the college for quality assurance is the IQAC, which monitors quality control, through various committees. Documentation of the various programmes / activities leading to quality enhancement is taken up. The annual quality assurance report (AQAR) is submitted to NAAC based on quality parameters. The IQAC ensures quality enhancements continuously in improving the curriculum, teaching-learning process, research consultancy and extension, infrastructure and learning resources, students' support and progression, governance and leadership and innovative practices. The college evaluates enrichment programmes through various tests, home assignments, students' seminars, group discussions, project works, participation in co-curricular and extra-curricular activities, and the extent of the student's success.

#### 1.4 Feedback System

### 1.4.1 What are the contributions of the institution in the design and development of the curriculum prepared by the University?

Designing and restructuring of courses mainly lies with the Affiliating University. The college, however, makes significant contribution in the curriculum design and development through the faculties who are the members of Boards of Studies in various subjects. Taking into consideration, the suggestions by the faculties of the other institutions, they frame the syllabi of the courses/ subjects.

In the workshops conducted in various colleges on the revised syllabus with the help of Parent University suggestions received from the teachers are considered for the development of the curriculum. Such 06 workshops of different subjects have been conducted by the college in last 3 years.

## 1.4.2 Is there a formal mechanism to obtain feedback from students and stakeholders on Curriculum? If "yes", how is it communicated to the University and made use internally for curriculum enrichment and introducing changes/new programmes?

The existing programmes are reviewed and feedback from students, alumni, parents, academic peers and community are obtained for formulation and introduction of new courses. The feedback thus obtained is analyzed and the findings of the same are considered for the enrichment of the curriculum and for the intensification of the teaching activity. These suggestions are communicated to the members of the concerned Boards of Studies, and in the workshops on the revised syllabi.

### 1.4.3 How many new programmes/courses were introduced by the institution during the last four years? What was the rationale for introducing new courses/programmes?)

The following new courses are introduced by the college during the last five years:

- 1. M.Sc. (Organic Chemistry) The intake has been increased from 20 to 40
- 2. B.Sc. Botany, Statistics and Computer science
- 3. Principle Of Marketing at B.Com.I
- 4. Certificate Course in Travel and Tourism
- 5. Certificate Course in Functional English
- 6. Certificate Course in Human Rights Education (UG)
- 7. P.G. Diploma Course in Human Rights Education

The rational behind starting these programs is the demand by the students and parents, and to equip the students for the self employment.

### CRITERION II: TEACHING - LEARNING AND EVALUATION

#### 2.1 Student Enrollment and Profile

### 2.1.1 How does the college ensure publicity and transparency in the admission process?

#### > Publicity -

The college ensures the publicity of the admission process by displaying notices on notice boards and digital boards in college campus, and also by publishing the admission notice in newspapers.

#### > Prospectus -

Every year the college prepares and provides the prospectus to the students prior to the admission process.

- After giving information regarding the parent institute in brief, the prospectus highlights courses offered and facilities provided by the college.
- It contains the application form and details regarding the rules and regulations of the admission process.
- It gives important information like intake capacity, scholarships, etc.
- It mentions subject combinations, programmewise fee structures for all the offered courses.
- It provides the eligibility criteria and the documents required for the admission.

#### > Transparency -

- The College follows the rules and regulations laid down by the Government of Maharashtra and Shivaji University, Kolhapur.
- Admission schedule is displayed on the notice board well-in advance indicating starting and closing dates of admission.
- Admission process is conducted by the admission committee comprising Principal, faculty members and office staff.
- Other concerned faculty members also guide the students for choice of course and subjects.
- Transparency in the admission process is ensured by preparing merit lists as per Government and University rules and regulations regarding reservation policy and is displayed on the notice board programmewise.
- Any discrepancies regarding admission are resolved by the Principal and the committee.
- 2.1.2 Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission (Ex. (i) merit (ii) common admission test conducted by state agencies and national agencies (iii) combination of merit and entrance test or merit, entrance test and interview (iv) any other) to various programmes of the Institution.
  - The admission process is conducted as per the university and government rules. The reservation policy of Maharashtra Government is strictly followed.
  - Admissions are given purely on merit basis. The college does not conduct any entrance examination for admission.
  - The score of +2 examination is considered for the admission for the first year. The score of the first and second year university examination is taken into account for the admission for the second and third year respectively.
  - The programme-wise admission committees are formed every year which conduct entire admission process under the supervision of the Principal.
  - Due to rush of students for the admission for first year programme of undergraduate courses (B.A., B. Com., B. Sc.), some students are admitted on non-grant basis.
  - For the professional course B.C.A., the admissions are given on the basis of the +2 examination score.

- For the M.A. programme, there is no merit list, but for the M. Sc. programme, there is combination of entrance examination and third year merit. The admission process for M. Sc. programme is entirely conducted by Shivaji University, Kolhapur and the list of selected students is provided by the University to the college.
- Interested students are admitted for COC courses on the first-come-first-serve-basis.

- Admissions for all UG courses are based on merit of previous examination.

  - Economically weaker sections
  - Minority community
  - Any other.

The different sections of the society like SC/ST/OBC/differently abled /women/economically weaker sections/minority community, etc. are duly represented in the admission process as the college strictly follows the reservation policy of the Government of Maharashtra. If the students from reserved category are not available, the vacant seats are filled by students in open category adhering to the State Government rules.

• SC/ST/OBC – Admission committee takes care to ensure the category-wise reservations while preparing merit lists (SC 13%, ST 7%, OBC 19%, NT-A,B,C,D 11%). Vacant seats are fulfilled by students from other categories as per the rules.. Scholarships are given to all eligible SC/ST/OBC students.

During the last four years, there is considerable increase in the demand for the B. A./B.Com./B.Sc. programmes due to good H.S.C. results. To fulfill the demand, the management has started new divisions on non-grant basis.

#### 2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

### 2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently-abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regard?

The government rules regarding reservation are followed to provide admissions to differently-abled students. The faculty members take special care of these students. The college has provided the facility of ramps in the building for their convenience. Support staff also provides manual help, if required, to these students.

For their convenience, timetable committee arranges the classes of such students on the ground floor. At the time of examinations, writers are provided to the physically disabled students who are unable to write, with prior permission of the University.

## 2.2.2 Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programme? If 'yes', give details on the process.

Yes, the institution assesses the students' need in terms of knowledge and skills before the commencement of the programmes. The faculty members interact with the students in the classrooms, know their scores in previous examinations and assess their knowledge and other skills. The faculty members guide the students regarding future career options, the competitive examinations and scholarships in the beginning of each academic year. The students are informed orally regarding the facilities such as internet and library access provided in the college, which will be beneficial for their academic progress. Students are informed regarding the disciplines to be followed in the college campus.

## 2.2.3 What are the strategies adopted by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students (Bridge/Remedial/ Add-on/Enrichment Courses, etc.) to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice?

Through the interaction and discussion with students in the introductory lectures in classrooms, the faculty members encourage weaker students to resolve their difficulties in the respective subjects. Remedial lectures are conducted every year for these students. Lectures of eminent persons are arranged throughout the year.

### 2.2.4 How does the college sensitize its staff and students on issues such as gender, inclusion, environment etc.?

- The staff and students of the college are sensitized on issues like gender, inclusion, environment, etc. through various activities.
- The college ensures secure environment to the female students for co-education by conducting awareness programmes, workshops for them. Guest lectures, workshops and conferences are arranged to sensitize the students and staff.
- The college has Internal Complaints Committee for women's empowerment and prevention of sexual harassment.
- Both male and female students equally participate in various activities like plantation, literacy programmes, blood donation camps in the college campus as well as in nearby places organized by college. NSS and NCC organize these events regularly.
- Students are encouraged to take part in cultural competitions as well as quiz competitions arranged by various student associations at district level and University level.
- Green College Project inspired the students and faculty members for plantation of trees of various species all over the college campus.
- Special care of adopted plants taken by the students resulted into green campus.

### 2.2.5 How does the institution identify and respond to special educational/learning needs of advanced learners?

- Advanced learners are indentified through their previous academic performance in the introductory lectures, discussions by subject teachers.
- These students are encouraged to communicate with the respective teachers to resolve their difficulties and enhance their knowledge.
- These students are encouraged to refer and read the books in the library to improve their affinity for reading.
- These students are motivated to solve question papers of previous University examinations.
- Free internet facility is provided in the library and other college departments for UG and PG students.

- These students are encouraged to take part in various competitions like Avishkarposter presentation competition, subject-wise quiz and elocution competitions, etc.
- Students interested to appear for different competitive examinations are given special counseling, coaching, and a study centre is provided for their study.
- PG students are encouraged to appear for NET/SET examinations and guided for the same by the faculty members and visiting subject experts.
- Special functions are arranged every year in college to felicitate the meritorious students.
- 2.2.6 How does the institute collect, analyze and use the data and information on the academic performance (through the programme duration) of the students at risk of drop out (students from the disadvantaged sections of society, physically challenged, slow learners, economically weaker sections etc. who may discontinue their studies if some sort of support is not provided)?
  - College departments analyze the results every year and take decisions to improve the results, if necessary.
  - Periodical class tests, discussions are conducted by teachers individually based on the syllabus taught.
  - Departmental meetings are held regularly to resolve academic problems and other difficulties.
  - Students are encouraged to use the library and internet facility to improve their knowledge and academic record.
  - These students are motivated to solve question papers of previous University examinations.
  - Economically backward students are provided financial assistance through Students' Aid Fund, 'Earn and Learn' scheme, etc. The following table indicates financial assistance provided to the students:

• For the slow learners, remedial coaching is provided to improve

their performance. The faculty members guide students personally, help them to solve their difficulty and even give them financial support.

#### 2.3 Teaching-Learning Process

### 2.3.1 How does the college plan and organize the teaching, learning and evaluation schedules? (Academic calendar, teaching plan, evaluation blue print, etc.)

Before the commencement of every academic year, the institution prepares the Academic calender. The Heads of Departments assign workload to the faculty members as per the UGC norms. If the departments have inadequacy of faculty, the excess work is distributed among the existing staff and temporary teachers.

Programme-wise time table is prepared for the academic year and displayed on the notice board of each department well in advance.

Extra lectures are arranged on holidays and Sundays to complete the syllabus as per the academic calendar.

The departments and individual teachers prepare their month-wise teaching plan. The Principal reviews the teaching-learning progress at regular intervals through individual academic diaries of teachers.

The students' progress is monitored regularly by conducting open-book tests, surprise tests, seminars, projects and home assignments. The internal examination schedule is prepared based on the dates announced by the University for the Final Examination. Semester-wise examinations are conducted and evaluation process is implemented every year as per the schedule of Shivaji University, Kolhapur.

The first year examinations for the UG programmes are conducted by the college as per University rules. The faculty members are appointed as invigilator and examiners. The second and third year UG examinations and PG examinations, practical examinations are conducted by the University.

#### 2.3.2 How does IQAC contribute to improve the teaching –learning process?

The IQAC plans the academic activities and conveys these plans to the faculty members in the staff meeting arranged at the beginning of the year. The departments, college committees and faculty members make arrangements to implement these activities throughout the year. In the last meeting of the academic year, a review of the activities is taken, and a future plan is discussed for the next academic year.

The faculty members are encouraged to submit their proposals to various funding agencies for research projects. Nearly all faculty members are engaged in their project work. The faculty members are encouraged to participate in seminars/ conferences/ workshops/training programmes.

The college also organizes National, State and University level seminars/conferences/workshops and expert lectures every year.

The college provides open access to computers and internet facility to students and faculty members throughout the year.

The college also plans to generate financial funding from various schemes provided by UGC and different agencies from time to time to enhance the academic, and infrastructural facilities.

The college conducts various Lead College activities to improve co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.

The college arranges intermediate alumni meet to convey the information regarding progress and asks for the suggestions for the improvement. Feedback is obtained from students to improve teaching-learning process.

## 2.3.3 How is learning made more student-centric? Give details on the support structures and systems available for teachers to develop skills like interactive learning, collaborative learning and independent learning among the students?

The learning is made more student-centric by focusing on specific methods to make it interactive. Students' seminars and group discussions are arranged for the special subjects at Third Year. The audio-visual aids like computers and projectors are made available to the students. The students are encouraged to take parts in quiz competitions, preparation of assignments, seminars, project writing, poster presentations, writing articles, etc.

The departments arrange visit to library for students which create interest in students and enhance their knowledge.

The educational tours, excursions, visits to research laboratories, industrial units and university departments are arranged every year. The students and the teachers are benefited with these activities.

The B.Sc. and M.Sc. students are encouraged to carry out their project work to enhance research aptitude in them. The departmental laboratories, computers, internet and library facilities are made available for smooth working of their project work. Some students undertake their project work in different institutes and research centers. The Science faculty of our college arranges poster presentation competition 'New Horizons' for the students. The Research Committee of the college provide guidance to the students, and the students are encouraged to participate in poster presentation competition 'Avishkar' arranged by the Shivaji University, Kolhapur for all subjects.

The college also organizes co-curricular, extra-curricular, sports and cultural events which help the students in developing their skills.

The students are motivated to participate in various activities organized by Shivaji University, Kolhapur and other colleges and various Lead College activities.

## 2.3.4 How does the institution nurture critical thinking, creativity and scientific temper among the students to transform them into life-long learners and innovators?

- The college encourages the students to publish their creative writings, poems, drawing, paintings in the college magazine 'Sanskar' including articles in various languages and disciplines. The students are motivated to display their creativities on display board 'Vasant Bhittipatrika' throughout the year. The departments encourage their students to display their writings on the notice board.
- The college conducted workshop on creative writing to enhance critical thinking and creativity in students. The students of Marathi Department edit and publish 'Yuva

- Spandan', a collection of articles contributed by the students.
- Students are motivated to take part in various competitions and Youth Festival to cherish their skills.
- The students are motivated to appear in competitive examinations like UPSC, MPSC, GATE, NET, SET, Banking etc.
- All these efforts are made by the college to transform the students into life-long learners and innovators.
- The college gives opportunity to the students to acquire exposure to their aims through NCC, NSS and cultural activities.
- The college provides various opportunities to nurture creativity and scientific temper among the students. Students are encouraged for projects, seminars as well as for the participation in poster presentation competitions. Science departments have well-equipped laboratories available for students for their project work. The science faculty of our college arranges poster presentation competition 'New Horizons' for the students. The Research Committee of the college provides guidance to the students, and the students are encouraged to participate in poster presentation competition 'Avishkar' arranged by the University for all subjects.
- The students are motivated to participate in quiz competitions arranged by various associations at District and University level. Some departments arrange excursion tours, and industrial visits. Visits to research centers to create scientific temper among students
- Our college arranges National Conferences, Seminars and Workshops where both students and teachers get regular exposure to recent developments in their respective field.
- 2.3.5 What are the technologies and facilities available and used by the faculty for effective teaching? Eg: Virtual laboratories, e-learning resources from National Programme on Technology Enhanced Learning (NPTEL) and National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology (NME-ICT), open educational resources, mobile education, etc.
  - The college is aware about the utilization of modern technologies and facilities to enhance teaching-learning process. For this purpose the college provide various facilities as follows:
  - The departments are provided with computers, laptops with internet connectivity, Wi-Fi facility (in some departments), printers and scanners. The classrooms are wellequipped with audio-visual facilities, LCD projectors (in some departments).
  - The teachers use all these facilities to improve the teaching-learning process.
  - Now our faculty is about 90% computer literate and use internet facility for reference work and also for teaching process.
  - Some of the faculty members prepare and use powerpoint presentations to make their teaching more effective along with the use of charts, posters and models.
  - The students and teachers are encouraged to use internet facilities for their academic work as well as to take opportunity to access informative sites.
  - The college has subscribed for INFLIBNET, N-list, through which 97000+ e-books and 6000+ e-journals are made available to the faculty members and students.

### 2.3.6 How are the students and faculty exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills (blended learning, expert lectures, seminars, workshops etc.)?

The students and faculty utilize the facilities like newspapers, research journals, magazines, periodicals in various languages provided in the central library for upgradation of their knowledge. The departmental libraries provide references and research journals of the respective subject. About 97000+e-books and 6000+e-

journals are made available to the faculty members and students through INFLIBNET and N-list.

The students and faculty members regularly access internet and stay updated with recent knowledge.

Many departments encourage the students to collect and display Newspaper articles or Science magazine articles and their own articles on recent developments in the respective subjects.

The faculty members regularly participate in State, National and International level conferences, seminars and workshops and present their work in their research areas. Nearly all faculty members are engaged in their research projects. Most of our Faculty members are Ph.D. and M.Phil. degree holders. Some faculty members are registered for Ph.D./M. Phil.

The faculty members are facilitated to attend short-term courses, summer/winter schools, orientation and refresher programmes to give the exposure for recent advancements in their subjects.

The students are encouraged to perform the projects and to present their work in poster-presentation competitions.

Expert lectures are arranged throughout the year on a variety of topics for blended learning.

## 2.3.7 Detail (process and the number of students \benefitted) on the academic, personal and psycho-social support and guidance services (professional counseling/mentoring/academic advise) provided to students?

The college has constituted various committees like Grievance Redressal Committee, Internal Complaints Committee, Discipline Committee, Placement Cell to provide academic, personal and psycho-social support to the students.

The college has Career Guidance Cell and Placement Cell. The Placement Cell members guide the students about job opportunities and conduct the campus interview for UG and PG students, and the students are also sent for off campus placements. Companies like Thermax Pvt. Ltd., ICICI, Ideal Agricultural Search have interviewed and recruited several students in the last five years. Career Guidance Cell arranges guest lectures and encourages the students by providing guidance and suggestions. The reading material is available for the students preparing for their competitive examinations in a separate reading room for 24 hours.

#### 2.3.8 Provide details of innovative teaching approaches/methods adopted by the

## faculty during the last four years? What are the efforts made by the institution to encourage the faulty to adopt new and innovative approaches and the impact of such innovative practices on student learning?

- **1.** All the faculty and departments have adopted innovative teaching methods in their subjects.
- 2. The faculty members use ICT for making effective teaching and encourage the students to use the same for their seminars and project presentations. If necessary, they assist and train the students for this purpose.
- **3.** Expert lectures are organized to expose our students to the recent developments in science and technology. The departments encourage the students to use softwares useful in their subjects. Students are acquiring technical knowledge in their subjects.
- **4.** The faculty use the facilities provided by the college like internet, Wi-Fi facilities, computers for effective teaching.
- **5.** Science laboratories are well-equipped, recognized research laboratories and made available for students and faculty for their research work.
- **6.** The faculty members attend Conferences, Seminars and Workshops for updating their subject knowledge.
- **7.** The faculty members attend various refresher, orientation and summer courses to improve subject and teaching aptitude among them.
- **8.** Many of the faculty members have undertaken various projects funded by the UGC, DST, etc.

#### 2.3.9 How are library resources used to augment the teaching-learning process?

- 1. The library resources are used to augment the teaching-learning process by providing the library facility to faculty members and students for all working days and also during vacations.
- 2. The open access is given to UG and PG students as per their requirement. A 'Book Bank' facility is provided to students.
- **3.** The books under this scheme are issued for an academic year. E-resources are available through INFLIBNET and N-LIST.
- **4.** There are separate sections for reference books, textbooks and periodicals in the central library.
- **5.** The college purchases the text books and reference books every year as per the requirement of the students. Book exhibitions are organized on various occasions such as Vivekanand saptah.
- **6**. Our Central library has 77811 books, **72** periodicals and 12 daily newspapers. Our library also has CD collection of subject topics. The library has a reading room with seating capacity of 50 students.
- **7.** The students are allowed to borrow books ones in every week. The library also provides internet facility to the students.
- **8.** The library visits of last year UG and PG students enhance the interest of students in various subjects.

- Due to Semester pattern and late declaration of results, there are various challenges in completing the given curriculum within the scheduled time.
- To overcome the difficulties that arise, the college prepares academic plan at the commencement of the academic year. After work load distribution by the departments, the faculty members prepare their individual teaching plan for the scheduled time and syllabus.
- The college makes all the attempts to complete admissions before 10<sup>th</sup> July every year

- in any case.
- Eventhough due to unavoidable problems, some difficulties may arise while completing the curriculum in the scheduled timeframe. Under such circumstances, the faculty members arrange extra lectures on holidays and sundays to cover the curriculum.

- Syllabus completion reports are taken from the faculty members at the end of each semester.

To meet the changing requirements of the curriculum, the faculties are allowed to Orientation/Refresher Courses, FIP, Summer/Winter Schools and to participate in the workshops on revised syllabi. The faculty members are encouraged to participate and to present their research work in National and International Conferences, Seminars. The faculty members are encouraged to do the research work by undertaking Major and Minor research projects. The teachers are granted study leaves under FIP to upgrade their qualification by doing M. Phil. or Ph. D.

Some faculty members have worked as resource persons at workshops on revised syllabi. Some faculty members are members of board of studies of their respective subjects and are involved in syllabus formation. Many faculty members have published books in their respective subject.

As per the management rules, the services of the faculties are transferable, but the management tries to retain the faculties in the college for prolonged tenure due to their competency and contribution in the development of the college.

2.4.2 How does the institution cope with the growing demand/ scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes/ modern areas (emerging areas) of study being introduced (Biotechnology, IT, Bioinformatics etc.)? Provide details on the efforts made by the institution in this direction and the outcome

#### during the last three years.

To cope up with the growing demands/scarcity of qualified senior faculty to teach new programmes, such as BCA, B.Sc. (Computer Science), the college also submits the requirement of the faculty to the management. With the prior permission of the management the college conducts walk-in-interviews by publishing advertisements in newspapers and the new appointments are made through the LMC of the college by adopting proper procedure. #### > Content/knowledge management

The faculty members regularly make the students aware about the latest reference books in their subjects available in the central library.

#### > Selection, development and use of enrichment materials

The college has a well-equipped central library with 77811 reference books own all subjects, 72 periodicals and 12 daily newspapers. In addition to this, the college has subscribed for INFLIBNET N-list, through which 6000+ e-journals and 97000+ e-books are made available to the faculty members.

The faculty members are encouraged to prepare computer-aided materials to improve teaching-learning process. Many faculty members are involved in writing text books based on the curriculum. Many departments prepare the charts and lab manuals for the practical work in the laboratory.

#### Assessment

The faculty members and departments organize class tests, open book tests to improve the learning of students.

#### Cross cutting issues

The cross cutting issues like gender, environment education, mental and physical health, ICT are given much attention. The experts are invited to share their knowledge with faculty members and students.

The college organized workshops and seminars to endeavor the attention of faculty members and students to these subjects.

#### > Audio Visual Aids/multimedia

The class rooms are provided with audio visual aids to enhance education strategies. The administrative staff and faculty members are computer literate and use internet facility to improve teaching-learning process.

The departments are provided with computers, internet, Wi-Fi facilities available for faculty members and students for upgrading their knowledge.

#### > Teaching learning material development, selection and use

Many faculty members are involved in writing text books based on the curriculum and prepare the charts and practical hand books for the practical work in the laboratory.

They select the textbooks and reference books to be purchased by the college library which assist the students in their academic work. The faculty members provide the notes, easy learning materials, question bank to the students.

The faculty members and students use internet facility to collect learning material required to them.

The faculty members prepare PowerPoint presentations, charts, models to improve teaching-learning process.

The college adopts the following policies/systems to recharge teachers:

- The faculty members are recharged by assessment by 'ACADEMIC AND ADMINISTRATIVE AUDIT', by the panel of peers appointed by the management.
- The faculty members have to maintain Academic Diary, submission of PBAS reports at the end of every academic year.
- The research culture is developed among the faculties by encouraging them to take up minor and major research projects from various funding agencies.
- We have Twenty Eight Minor Research Projects; among these, Sixteen Minor Research Projects are ongoing and Tewlve Minor Research Projects are completed. Three Major Research Projects are ongoing, these projects are sanctioned by various funding agencies like UGC, DST, etc.
- Our College has 11 research guides and 4 recognized research laboratories facilitating the students and faculty members opportunities in research and development.
- These departments provide consultancy services.
- Our faculty members have published <u>78</u> National and <u>90</u> International research papers in reputed research journals during the last five years.
- They are also encouraged to participate and present research papers in National and International Conferences and Seminars by sanctioning duty leave and TA to them.
- Some faculty members have presented their research papers in International Conferences organized abroad at Bangkok, Japan, Shrilanka.
- The college has arranged National Conferences/ Seminars in various subjects.
- The college encourages the faculties to attain additional qualifications by sanctioning leave to them.
- The college deputes the faculties to attend Orientation, Refresher, Short-term courses and Training courses by sanctioning study leaves.
- The faculty members are felicitated for their achievements in a special programme organized every year.
- The faculty members can use the computers, printers, internet facility, Wi-Fi available in College campus. Xerox facility is also provided to them in the College Campus.

# 2.4.6 Has the institution introduced evaluation of teachers by the students and external Peers? If yes, how is the evaluation used for improving the quality of the teaching-learning process?

Yes. The college has planned a feedback system for the evaluation of teachers by students every year. A specific proforma is prepared for this feedback. Students also give their feedback in the form of suggestions dropped in the suggestion box. The feedback is analyzed and the necessary actions are taken to improve the quality of teaching-learning process.

The faculty members are yearly assessed by 'Academic and Administrative Audit panel', the panel of external peers appointed by the management. The panel members visit every department and interact with each faculty member individually to evaluate their performance. At the end of the visit of the Academic and Administrative Audit panel, an exhaustive evaluative report is submitted to the Principal based on a SWOC analysis.

#### 2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

### 2.5.1 How does the institution ensure that the stakeholders of the institution especially students and faculty are aware of the evaluation processes?

In the beginning of every academic year, the students are informed about the syllabus and evaluation process constructed by the university. The students are encouraged to solve the previous question papers and faculty members guide them in this regard by discussing question papers' pattern with the students in class with respect to marking scheme and answer pattern.

The students are made aware of evaluation processes by informing them through college notice boards. The students are informed well in advance about the dates and timetable of internal examinations and external university examinations.

The record of university examination results is maintained and analyzed by the departments every year.

The progress of students and expectations, suggestions of parents are coferred by organizing the parent meet for final year students only.

### 2.5.2 What are the major evaluation reforms of the university that the institution has adopted and what are the reforms initiated by the institution on its own?

The university has introduced semester pattern from June 2010. The examinations of first year of all the programmes are conducted by the college on behalf of the university. Only the question papers and answer books are provided by the university. The answer books are evaluated at the college level by the faculties of the college. Then, the marks are communicated to the university and the university declares the results. The examinations of the second and third year are conducted by the university. Our Principal Dr. R. R. Kumbhar is the member of the University Examination Reformation Committee.

In addition to the reforms initiated by the university, the college implements various strategies to evaluate the students through class tests, open book tests, etc.

### 2.5.3 How does the institution ensure effective implementation of the evaluation reforms of the university and those initiated by the institution on its own?

The college follows the university norms and guidelines for conducting examinations and evaluation. A separate examination committee is formed for conducting examination and evaluation in the college. The faculty members are appointed as invigilators and as examiners for the assessment. The examination committee plans the whole process to complete within stipulated time.

The college follows the university norms and guidelines for the assessment of students. The formative and summative assessment approaches are adopted by the

college. In the formative approaches, class tests, open book tests, home assignments are conducted.

Due to these approaches students' performance in final examinations is improved and some students hold the ranks in University merit lists.

The Summative evaluation is carried out by University. It includes Semester theory and practical examinations, Project work. The evaluation of these examinations is carried out by the examiners appointed by the university.

# 2.5.5 Detail on the significant improvements made in ensuring rigor and transparency in the internal assessment during the last four years and weightages assigned for the overall development of students (weightage for behavioral aspects, independent learning, communication skills etc.

In order to ensure rigor and transparency in the internal assessment, the time table of internal assessment is communicated to the students well in advance on the notice board and they are also made aware of the evaluation pattern. The assessed answer books are shown to the students and their doubts are cleared.

The college prepares the Academic Calendar at the beginning of every academic year. Regular teaching is done as per the time table which is prepared at the beginning of the academic year. Syllabus is covered as per the teaching plan prepared by the concerned department and the faculty member. The faculties maintain their Academic Diaries and get signed by the Principal at the end of every month. The syllabus completion reports are submitted to the Principal by the faculties at the end of each semester. Various extra-curricular, co-curricular activities are organized regularly.

The teaching, learning and assessment processes are reviewed by the peer team appointed by the management.

# 2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student placements, entrepreneurship, innovation and research aptitude developed among students etc.) of the courses offered?

The college has a Career Guidance and Placement Cell. It guides about job opportunities and also arranges campus interviews for UG and PG students. Companies like Thermax Pvt. Ltd., Indian Agriculture Development Pvt. Ltd., Ideal Agricultural Search, Patani Computers, ICICI Bank have interviewed and recruited several students in the last five years.

The B.Sc. and M.Sc. students are encouraged to carry out their project work to enhance research aptitude among the students. The departmental laboratories, computers, internet and library facilities are made available for smooth working of their project work. Some students undertake their project work in different institutes and research centers. The science faculty of our college arranges poster presentation competition 'New Horizons' for the students. The students are encouraged to

participate in poster presentation competition 'Avishkar' arranged by the University for all subjects.

The departments organize the visits to the industries enhancing the students' interest.

The college also organizes co-curricular, extra-curricular, sports and cultural events which help the students in developing their skills. The students are motivated to participate in various activities organized by Shivaji university, Kolhapur and other colleges and various Lead College activities. The college gives opportunity to the students to acquire exposure to their aims through NCC, NSS and cultural activities.

### 2.6.5 How does the institution collect and analyze data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

The examination results are collected after the declaration of results for the respective programme by the university. These results are analyzed by the departments. The instructions are given to the concerned faculty to motivate the slow learners. The slow learners are also guided through the remedial coaching scheme. The attendance is taken compulsorily in every lecture and practical. Counseling is given by the head of particular department and other faculty members to the students who are absent for long time.

The feedback is also taken from the students on teaching through the feedback forms and the suggestions dropped in the suggestion boxes.

### 2.6.6 How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

In the beginning of the academic year, a timetable and an academic calendar are prepared. It is ensured that lectures are engaged by the staff as per the timetable. The faculty members keep record in the form of academic diaries. The Principal monitors the dairies and gives suggestions to enhance the teaching —learning process. The college monitors the achievement of the learning outcomes through the analysis of the results of the university examinations. The examination results are collected after the declaration of results for the respective programme by the university. These results are analyzed by the departments. The faculty members motivate the slow learners and guide the advanced learners to improve their performance.

The teachers use assessment and evaluation outcomes as an indicator for evaluating student performance, achievement of learning objectives and planning. The class tests, surprise tests, open book tests, seminars, home assignments are also used as indicators of the students' performance.

The faculty members motivate the slow learners by extra coaching and guide the advanced learners to improve their performance.

This process results in the improvement of the students' performance in the final examination and some student hold the ranks in University merit lists.

The quique formative and summative assessment approaches are adopted by the college. In the formative approaches, class tests, open book tests, home assignments are conducted. Due to these approaches students' performance in final examinations is improved and some students hold the ranks in University merit lists.

The Summative evaluation is carried out by University. It includes Semester theory and practical examinations, Project work. The evaluation of these examinations is carried out by the examiners appointed by the university.

### 3.1.3 What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/ projects?

#### Autonomy to the principal investigator

Complete academic autonomy is granted to the principal investigator in proposing and executing projects. The college also extends freedom to utilize financial grants received from the funding agencies to implement research work within the stipulated time. All the facilities are provided to research scholars even after the working hours of the college.

#### • Timely availability or release of resources

The grants received for the research projects are disbursed to the principal investigator as per the norms of the funding agencies. Decisions regarding the purchase of equipment, books, chemicals, etc. are taken solely by the respective principal investigator. The efforts are always made for timely availability of resources for doing research work. The utilization certificate is submitted by the office in time to the funding agencies.

#### • Adequate infrastructure and human resources

The college provides research facilities, essential research infrastructure, research journals, e-journals and reference books. Internet facilities, including Wi-Fi are available free of charge, and adequate laboratory space along with water and power supply is also provided. The faculties are asked to prepare a budget for the ensuing year indicating the requirements of research. The college immediately sanctions demands for the replacement or purchase of equipments. Besides this, adequate assistance is also sought from other faculties in research activities.

#### • Time-off, reduced teaching load, special leave etc. to teachers

The research scholars are sanctioned study/duty leave to pursue their research, and also to attend seminars, conferences, workshops, to present their research work. They are also provided TA and DA as per the university norms.

#### • Support in terms of technology and information needs

The college provides required technological facilities like internet, wi-fi, computers, LCD, e-journals, etc. If any other information is needed by the faculty related to the research, the efforts are made to make it available immediately.

### • Facilitate timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding authorities

The college is always alert in getting timely auditing of research grants and forwarding the utilization certificates to the funding agencies.

#### Any other

There is a continuous and constant process of upgradation and renewal of research infrastructure in the college as per requirement of the faculties, and the instruments from the laboratories of the Science departments are readily available for the researchers.

### 3.1.4 What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

- **1.** To develop scientific temper as well as research culture among the students, the college plays a pro-active role by encouraging the students to actively involved in research.
- **2.** The departments organize seminars, study tours, industrial visits; and activities like wall-paper, poster presentation; project works, etc. are undertaken.
- **3.** To generate research aptitude among the students, the college provides laboratory facility, research journals, e-books, and internet facility.
- **4.** The students are motivated to participate in research competitions like Avishkar (a unique research activity for the students organized by Shivaji University, Kolhapur) and "NEW HORIZON", a unique research activity for the students organized by our college.
- **5.** Under the Inspire Scholarship from DST scheme, some students get scholarship of Rs. 80,000/- per year.
- **6.** The college has sought the grants of Rs.10, 00,000/- under Basic Scientific Research (BSR) for enrichment of the laboratories. Under this scheme, the college has enriched all the laboratories used by UG & PG students.

- Teachers having Ph. D. degree have been encouraged to obtain recognition as Research Guides for M. Phil. and Ph. D. in their respective areas.

The department of Science and Technology has sanctioned Rs.50 Lac to the college for strengthening the research laboratories under FIST programme.

#### 3.5 Consultancy

### 3.5.1 Give details of the systems and strategies for establishing institute industry interface.

The college has been continuously keeping contact with various industries in and around Tasgaon and Sangli. The college has developed this mechanism through the placement cell of the college. In addition to this, every department keeps healthy interactions with industries concerned with their subjects by a number of ways. Some of the activities to enhance the institute industry interface are as follows:

- 1. Departments like Chemistry, Botany, Zoology, and Computer Science arrange industrial visits for the final year UG students. Some of the industries to which visits are made are Sugar factories, food processing industries, etc.
- 2. Experts from the industries are invited to share their expertise with the faculty members as well as the students.
- 3. Meetings with eminent and leading industrialists are arranged and inputs from them are taken while designing the course curriculum.
- 5. The Placement Cell communicates with potential employers in various industries like IT industries, Banks, etc.
- 6. The students from Commerce visit the financial institutions like LIC, Banks, Industries, etc.

## 3.5.2 What is the stated policy of the institution to promote consultancy? How is the available expertise advocated and publicized?

To promote the consultancy, the Principal always encourages the faculty members in the staff meeting to identify and to take up consultancy projects in their respective areas of interest. The Principal also gives information about the expertise available in the college in the Parent Meets. ### 3.5.4 List the broad areas and major consultancy services provided by the institution and the revenue generated during the last four years.

The list of broad areas in which consultancy services are being provided is given below:

- Organic farming: Department of Botany provides consultancy to farmers in the area of organic farming, identification of diseases and pest management for the same, cultivation of Sugar Cane, cereals and pulses.
- Water and Soil Testing: Testing of quality of water and soil is being done in Department of Chemistry. This facility has been used by several research fellows from other institutions also.
- Analysis and characterization of compounds using IR spectrophotometer is being done by Department of Chemistry.
- Analysis of Explosives: Dept. of Chemistry has given to the police department analysis of explosives found in the city.
- Department of Commerce is extending help in Human Resource Management to industries and Transport Management.
- Department of Zoology guides the farmers to prepare the vermi compost by giving demonstration through a vermi culture unit of the college.
- Department of Computer Science provides consultancy in office automation, software development, etc.
- Department of Statistics is providing consultancy in Data analysis and interpretation of the results for the research works.

Some revenue is generated through the consultancy.

Due to the consultancies, the beneficiaries have maintained very good relationship with the college, and many times they give donations to the college Annual Magazine, and sponsorship is given to the seminars, workshops and other college activities.

#### INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

#### 4.1 Physical Facilities

### 4.1.1 What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

The college management is of the opinion that for effective teaching and learning, adequate and comprehensive infrastructure with effective learning resources is required. With this view, the college administration prepares a plan for creation and enhancement of infrastructure as well as upgrading and updating learning resources at periodic intervals.

All the infrastructural developments are made with a prior permission of the management. The funding is sought from the management, UGC, state government, central government, donations, fees, etc. The Development Fund Planning Committee has been established to monitor the entire process of development taking care of environment, health and cleanliness issues. The college takes into consideration the views of stakeholders while making development plans.

#### 4.1.2 Detail the facilities available for -

## a) Curricular and co-curricular activities— classrooms, technology enabled learning spaces, seminar halls, tutorial spaces, laboratories, botanical garden, Animal house, specialized facilities and equipment for teaching, learning and research etc.

The college campus is spread over of 11 acres. Curricular and Co-curricular activities of the college are carried out in 08 huge buildings viz., Main Building, New Building, Old Arts and Commerce Building, Old Science Building, New Science Building, Library Building, Gymkhana Building and Womens Hostel Building.

There are well-furnished 25 (09 in Main Building + 07 in New Building + 06 in old building + 04 in old Science Building +05 in New Sc. Building) classrooms available with sufficient light arrangement, wooden benches for sitting arrangements, glass boards and electric fans for ventilation, if necessary. The college activities are administered from cabin of the Principal which is well-equipped with state of art ICT equipments as well as well renovated administrative block which is located at ground floor of the Main Building.

For effective practical work, sufficiently renovated and well equipped 29 laboratories are available in the college with necessary facilities. Even air-condition facility is provided for the departments of Chemistry, Statistics and Computer Science. There is a well furnished Seminar hall available for academic and other activities.

There is a separate Library building for effective learning resources where necessary software is made available, so as to computerize it soon.

4.1.3 How does the institution plan and ensure that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized? Give specific examples of the facilities developed/augmented and the amount spent during the last four years (Enclose the Master Plan of the Institution / campus and indicate the existing physical infrastructure and the future planned expansions, if any).

The college plans and ensures that the available infrastructure is in line with its academic growth and is optimally utilized. The survey of the academic growth is taken in the year end meetings and the future plans are accordingly prepared. For the optimum use of the infrastructure, the college is run in two shifts. The practical batches with adequate number of students are formed and optimum use of laboratories is made from morning till evening in three sessions.

Upgradation of Chemistry, Physics, Zoology, Botany, Mathematics, Statistics and BCA laboratories.

- Renovation of the Principal's Cabin and Administrative Block, enhancement of sports facilities and library services, strengthening of extension facilities, strengthening of cultural activities facilities.
- For M. Phil and Ph. D. work, separate laboratories are developed.

By considering the limitations of the infrastructure and the increasing student strength, the college has prepared a well studied master plan with the help of a reputed technical consultant. This master plan has been prepared for the systematic use of available land for various purposes like parking, canteen, recreational areas, gate, indoor sports etc.

### 4.1.4 How does the institution ensure that the infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of students with physical disabilities?

The college makes all possible efforts to ensure that differently abled students are comfortable. It ensures that infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of the students with physical disabilities by accommodating their classes on the ground floor. The library services are intentionally installed on the ground floor with a ramp so that they have an easy access to it. There is a ramp in the Women Hostel also.

At the time to examinations, they are provided the writer to write their answer books in the case of visually impaired students and a student suffering from dyslexia. Even physically impaired students are given physical help to accommodate them to ground floor for their studies. The parent university has laid down the detail guidelines, regarding the facilities provided to differently abled students. These guidelines are strictly followed by the college.

### 4.1.5 Give details on the residential facility and various provisions available within them:

- Hostel Facility Accommodation available.
- Facilities for medical emergencies.
- Library facility in the hostels.
- Recreational facility-common room with audio-visual equipments and Gymnasium.
- Constant supply of safe drinking water.
- Security.

Hostel facility is provided for 48 girls (No. of Rooms: 16) with the facility of comfortable beds, necessary furniture and common bathroom facility with hot water and 24 hour water supply for regular use. For the hot water supply, a solar system is installed. The female students in the hostel are provided well balanced wholesome and nutritious food at reasonable rates. There is a Dining Hall with T.V. for entertainment along with clean and ultra-modern kitchen, and a common room. Daily newspapers are also made available for them. For the security, one full-time warden, Two maid servants, and round-the-clock security personnel are appointed. No person is allowed in the campus of the hostel without prior-permission of the authorities. Medical facilities are provided through the health centre of the college. At the time of medical emergencies, services from external agencies are sought.

### 4.1.6 What are the provisions made available to students and staff in terms of health care on the campus and off the campus?

For health care facilities, the visits of the doctors are scheduled in the health center at periodic intervals. Free health check-up camps are organized for the teaching and non-teaching staff of the college. Group insurance facility for the staff and the students is also provided with the help of parent university.

Separate units of coolers with water purifiers are installed in various places in the campus. There are separate toilet facilities for the male and female students, teaching and non-teaching staff, and a common ladies room, the Principal's cabin, IQAC/NSS/NCC rooms, and the library.

The college is now in a state of faster improvement process so as to cope up with the recent developments taking place in the field of higher education. To fill up these gaps, attempts are made from all the sides. The need is of quality assurance. Well disciplined documentation is becoming a need of all the institutions. To fulfill this requirement, the college has prepared a well equipped "IQAC" Documentation Center. This is the unique center which will become a main source of all the type of information of all the types of activities happening in the college. Not only this, the center will acquaint the teaching and non-teaching staff of the college with latest developments in the field of higher education. The center has been provided with all the latest Audio-Visual facilities.

- Manuscripts: Nil
- **Reference:** The Library has rich collection of print material and the library provides personal assistance to users, if required.
- **Reprography:** Reprography facility is available to all students and staff members. This facility we provide at the separate Xerox room.
- ILL (Inter Library Loan Service): The library can borrow the books from other libraries or issue the books to other libraries on inter library loan basis for a limited period of time. We have this service with different colleges. Our college staff takes benefits of this scheme.

- Information deployment and notification: Yes. The library information services are made available through OPAC, library webpage, new arrivals display, circulars and notices. A list of new arrivals in the library is communicated to the students and teachers through the addition list of books.
- **Download:** Yes. The library has downloading facility for the students and faculty. The e-resources (free and subscribed) are available in the library for download purpose.

- **Reading list/ Bibliography compilation:** Yes. Library has maintained compendium of special materials such as, Compendium of research work of faculty members, Compendium of project work of P.G. (Faculty of Chemistry and Arts).

## 4.3.5 How does the institution facilities extensive use of ICT resources including development and use of computer-aided teaching/learning material by its staff and students?

The department of Computer Science organizes faculty improvement program to assist the faculty of the collage to prepare computer-aided teaching-learning materials. The Department also organizes computer literacy program for non-teaching staff and the students to increase the awareness about the use of IT among them. The teaching and non-teaching

staff is deputed to attend the workshop/training programs on ICT to upgrade their knowledge. The students are encouraged to use ICT for their in-house presentations by providing technical assistance, if required. The collage website is also used to display and communicate necessary information for the stakeholders.

The collage has always been placing the students at the center of the teaching-learning process. The institute understands that the teachers have to be reoriented from time to time. The collage encourages the staff and technical assistants to undergo training on the computer aided teaching, and conduct departmental seminars and workshop for training on computer application (viz. Power Point, MS Word, MS Excel, MS Access and other necessary skills). The Department of Computer Science also organizes training sessions on the use of internet as a learning resource, conducting seminars and workshop in various fields related to the use of computer hardware and software . Well Equipped computer Labs, LCD Projector are available to the faculty for conducting seminars, workshop, computer aided training, faculty development training programs and conferences

Yes, as the information available in the manual of NAAC the college has emphasized on the online courses available for the students. And as mentioned in the NAAC manual the online courses available from NATIONAL PROGRAM ON TECHNOLOGY ENHANCED LEARNING (NPTEL) and NATIONAL MISSION ON EDUCATION THROUGH INFORMATION AND COMMUNICATION TECHNOLOGY (NME-ICT). We are happy to inform that many of the students from our college are keen about these courses and online lectures of eminent persons from IIT and IIM institutes. A lot of students are benefitted from this activity.

### 4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?

The college has its own mechanism for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipments. The HoDs submit their requirements to the Principal, and the Principal, in the meetings with the HoDs and LMC, finalizes the necessary steps to be taken in this regard. The college provides masons, plumbers, carpenters, and other required human resources, and thus the minor maintenance is done at the department level. In-campus lighting, path ways, electrical supply, water supply, sewage, LPG, air conditioning, teaching aids of the departments are maintained with the help of the college staff. The major maintenance and repairs are outsourced through external agencies through AMCs.

For the proper maintenance of equipments, furniture, laboratories, and classrooms, the budget provisions are made on need basis as per requirements from the Heads of the departments. These budget provisions and allocations are made at the beginning of the financial year with the approval of the LMC and management.

### 4.4.3 How and with what frequency does the institute take up calibration and other precision measures for the equipment/ instruments?

The laboratory equipment and instruments are calibrated by the teaching and non-teaching staff of the respective departments before the commencement of annual practical examinations. For certain equipments, the stabilizers and air-conditioners are provided to maintain precision of the instruments. These devices are maintained and repaired through funds available in the college. The computers of different departments are maintained through a full time technician appointed for overall maintenance of the computers. The technician is assisted by two laboratory assistants of the Department of Computer Science.

For major problems, the external services are sought on the contract or need basis for which special provisions are made in the annual budget. The college has salaried staffs who are expert in electrical, carpentry, housekeeping, masonary, plumbing, painting, security, and generator maintenance. Their services are readily available on the campus.

### 4.4.4 What are the major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)?

The sensitive equipments are located in proper places taking adequate measures for their protection and storage.

The college has a power house with high tension electric supply with the transformer within the college campus. The college has also electric power generator of 169 KVA capacity. The voltage stabilizers have been installed for safety of sensitive equipments. Some equipments like FTIR Spectrophotometer are kept in an air-conditioned room. Entire B. Sc. Computer Science & Statistics laboratories are fully air-conditioned.

The maintenance of equipments is done through the annual maintenance contract while minor repairs are carried out on request through complaints register system. The constant water supply is assured through the big underground storage which is a natural source of water available for the whole year. The rain water harvesting system is used to collect the water in the storage.

Yes, the college publishes its updated prospectus for the U.G. and P.G. students every academic year. The institution ensures its commitment and accountability by providing every information and prompt services maintaining transparency. If the students have any problems, they can approach the concerned committees/departments. They can even use the complaint/suggestions boxes installed in the college campus to put up their problems.

The college provides support services/facilities to students who participate in national and international competitions as follows—

- The students who participate in sports, extension, and extra-curricular activities are given special guidance by the faculty.
- If they are from science faculty practicals are adjusted in extra batches as per their convenience.
- The College conducts separate internal examinations for the students, if necessary.
- The students are paid TA, DA and additional allowance on the day of the event as per rules.
- Sports kits, track suits, blazers for sports persons, costumes for participants in Youth Festivals are provided.
- They are given the special cash prizes for participating at international level.
- They are also provided special coaching and guidance by the experts in the field.
- All such students are felicitated in the Annual Prize Distribution Function.

### • Medical assistance to students: Health center, Health Insurance etc.

The college has a Health Centre with visiting Physician. The college also provides group insurance to all the students in the college. In the case of accident, the sports persons are given financial assistance.

### • Organizing coaching classes for competitive exams

The college has established the competitive examination centre to provide coaching for various competitive examinations.

The following counseling services are made available to the students in the college:

- Psycho-social Counseling is done through professional counselors, and general counseling through different committees, personal interactions with the Principal and the faculties, etc.
- Specifically academic counseling is done through classroom teaching, parent-students meet, remedial coaching, library services, demonstrations, seminars, projects, workshops, field visits, educational tours, on-site training, etc.
- Counseling for career is done through Career Guidance Cell, Competitive Examinations Guidance Centre, Entrepreneurship Development Programme, organizing campus interviews, lectures of experts, etc.
- Psycho-social counseling is done through sensitizing activities of the *Jagar Janivancha* Campaign, Internal Complaints Committee, Special Cell/ Standing Committee, Grievance Redressal Cell, Health Centre, Yoga Centre, etc.
- Counseling for Sports and Cultural activities is mainly undertaken by Gymkhana Committee headed by the Director of Physical Education, Cultural Activities Committee, and special guidance from experts/coaches.

Yes, there is a structured mechanism for career guidance and placement of students. There are two Placement Officers looking after the functioning of the Placement Cell. The library services and free internet access are made available in the central library. The students are guided for defense services through NCC, for career in sports by the Gymkhana committee, career in cultural fields by Cultural Activities Committee, through COCs, and career in the social work by NSS.

The Placement Cell and Competitive Examination Guidance Centre provide information about the job/career opportunities, and organize campus interviews,

lectures, guidance sessions on interview techniques, soft skills development, etc. to prepare the students for employments. The students are also guided during regular teaching sessions and personal interactions.

#### • Sports and Games:

The sports facilities are available in Cricket, Volleyball, Football, Baseball, Kho-Kho, Kabbadi, Taekwondo, Basketball, Chock Ball, Weight Lifting, Body Building, Chess, Carom, Athletics, Yoga, etc. The college participates in various sports events as per All India Inter Universities Sports programmes. Our students participate in zonal, university, inter-university, national and inter-national level sports competitions.

The university, state and national level sports organizations prepare the programme calendars for the sports events.

#### • Cultural Activities:

Our students participate in local, university, state, national and international level cultural events like Youth festivals, Indradhanushya, Purushottam Karandak, Bhartiyam Kala Mahostav and Manoranjan Mandal competitions. Besides, the college organizes one-day Cultural Programme every year. Some of our students are working as heroes/heroines in the TV serials/ plays, RJs, and as anchors of TV programmes. Some of the students have prepared short films. The programme schedule of cultural activities is prepared by the respective organizers.

#### • Extracurricular Activities:

The extracurricular activities include Elocution, Debate, Quiz, Essay Writing, Slogan Contest, Rangoli, Mehandi, Drawing Competition, Cookery, Hair Style, Salad Decoration, the Best from Waste, Health Check Up/Awareness Camp, social awareness programmes, etc. The programme schedule of most of the activities is mentioned in the Academic Calendar of the college.

The college also conducts various COCs complementary to extracurricular activities. The departments like NSS and NCC also conduct extracurricular activities.

## 5.3.3 How does the college seek and use data and feedback from its graduates and employers to improve the performance and quality of institutional provisions?

The college has a system to collect feedback from its stakeholders which includes graduates and employers to improve the performance and quality of institutional provisions. We collect the feedback in structured formats from the final year graduate students. There is a representation of employers on the LMC, IQAC. The feedback from these representatives is sought during the meetings. The suggestions made by the graduates and employers are placed before the different administrative bodies for consideration and taking decisions.

For example, as per the demand from the graduates, M. Sc. (Org. Chem.) course was introduced. In the light of the suggestions made by the students, industrialists and professionals, the COC programmes have been introduced. As per the demand from the graduates of Computer students, the college has developed a new computer laboratory with 40 computers.

5.3.4 How does the college involve and encourage students to publish materials like catalogues, wall magazine, college magazine and other material? List the publications / materials brought out by the student during the previous four academic sessions.

Yes. The college involves and encourages the students to publish materials in the: publication of a college annual magazine "SANSKAR", news bulletin entitled "MY COLLEGE BULLETIN" and other students journals as "YUVA SPANDAN", "YUVA AVISHKAR", etc.

The students' writings for publication are invited by informing them well in advance. The writings are scrutinized /edited, if necessary, and guidance is provided. The material so collected is published in the form of wallpapers. The articles, with literary value, are then selected for publication in the annual "SANSKAR" every year. This has resulted in making the college annual rich in its contents and has become informative. The college also publishes the newspaper named "MY COLLEGE BULLETIN". It is published twice in an academic year. The news regarding various functions organized in the college are published in "MY COLLEGE BULLETIN". All the pieces of news are collected from the student reporters. Our students publish regularly Students' journals as "YUVA SPANDAN" and "YUVA AVISHKAR" etc. which are entirely edited, written, published by the students.

It boosts report-making talent in the students and contributes to the publication of the college.

## 5.3.5 Does the college have a student council or any similar body? Give details on its selection, constitution, activities and funding.

Yes. College has a Students' Council as per the Maharashtra University Act 1994. The council has 30 members out of which 24 are selected. The remaining 6 members are selected on merit basis to represent NSS, NCC, Cultural, and Sports, and two female representatives are nominated by the Principal. Out of these six, two should be from the reserved category. The student members of the Students' Council elect their General Secretary, and he represents the college in the university students' council.

During the academic year, the Students' Council meets at least three to four times. In these meetings, the members are informed about the academic as well as extra-curricular activities to be carried out.

## 5.3.6 Give details of various academic and administrative bodies that have student representatives on them.

There are various bodies which have student representatives like the College Student Council, NSS, NCC, Gymkhana Committee, Cultural Activities Committee, Library Committee, Magazine Committee, S. A. Fund Committee, etc.

## 5.3.7 How does the institution network and collaborate with the Alumni and former faculty of the institution?

The college networks and collaborates with the alumni and former faculty in the following ways:

- The alumni meet is organized every year.
- All the alumni and former faculties are invited for various programmes like annual prize distribution ceremony, national days, birth and death anniversaries of eminent personalities, and for guidance on various occasions.

- Former faculty members are invited as special guests at various departmental programs organized by the college.
- Former faculty members are invited as visiting faculty.
- The College website is one of the best means of communication for alumni scattered all over the world to keep in touch with the college and to communicate with the college authorities.

#### **CRITERION VI**

#### GOVERNANCE, LEADERSHIP AND MANAGEMENT

#### 6.1 Institutional Vision and Leadership

6.1.1 State the vision and mission of the Institution and enumerate on how the mission statement defines the institutions distinctive characteristics in terms of addressing the needs of the society, the students it seeks to serve, institutions traditions and value orientations, vision for the future, etc.

#### Vision and Mission statements of the institution:

The very motto of the management is Dissemination of education for Knowledge, Science and Culture. An integrated, all-round development of students' personality is our objective. With this motto in mind, we have the following visions and missions of the college:

- To provide quality education to all by means of hard work, dedication and devotion.
- Education to promote scientific attitude.
- Education to inculcate cultural values into the students and to make them better citizens of India with visions and values.
- To ensure values like truth, honesty, character, sacrifice etc. into the students and to prevent social exploitation through education.
- To aim at overall personality development through extracurricular activities.
- To attain community and social development through various activities.
- To provide a platform to the students to enhance their skills/potentials as well as a sense of social responsibility and nationality through sports, cultural activities, NCC, NSS, COCs, Placements, Entrepreneurship skills, etc.
- To train and coach the students to face competitive examinations.
- To help the students for on-the-job training and placement of jobs wherever possible.

The college aims at holistic development of the students through academic, cultural, sports and extension activities. The students from the various sectors of the society, irrespective of their caste, creed, gender, religion, geographical location are admitted in the college. They are admitted in the college as per the norms of the central government, state government, and UGC. The college ensures that the visions and missions of the institution are in tune with the higher education policies of the nation by introducing modern, professional and technical career-oriented courses, offering the benefit of education to all, facilitating economic empowerment of women through higher education, offering vocational education and Skill Development Programmes, economic, social and educational empowerment of under-privileged sections of society. As per the growing demands from the alumni, the college has also introduced a PG course in Organic Chemistry. In the mean time the intake capacity of this course is increased from 20 to 40. In the developing economy of India, the demand of professional courses has grown both in urban and rural areas during the last decade. This has encouraged the college to start professional courses like BCA. These professional courses have potential for getting jobs in various fields. At the same time the college has started three new subjects as Computer Science, Statistics and Botany for B.Sc. program and Principles of Marketing at B. Com. I level.

Our institution is purely educational run by teachers only. It was our founder's vision that the college should become a dynamic center of educational and cultural movement, and as a vehicle of social change. Considering the future development in education, the goals of

education were modified by giving emphasis on science and other courses. We aim at fully equipping our students to become modern global citizens.

## 6.1.2 What is the role of top management, Principal and Faculty in design and implementation of its quality policy and plans?

The Management, the Principal and faculty members work in conjunction to formulate and implement its quality policy and plans for assurance and sustenance of quality in higher education. The Management plays an important role in the development of infrastructure, and financial support for starting new courses and enhancing the quality of education. There is a special monitoring mechanism of the management to promote and sustain quality. As far as academics is concerned, the Principal and HoDs are given total academic freedom by the management.

The Local Managing Committee (LMC) takes decision on general policies for the overall development of the college.

The IQAC takes specific measures through deliberations and interactions by getting feedback from the departments and faculty.

There is an Academic Cell in our parent management named "Vidyasamiti" (Academic Cell), constituted by the management to look after the academic activities. The management has a system of Internal Assessment and Audit of both the academic and administrative work annually. The management also felicitates students and teachers for their academic excellence every year on 8th August, the Death Anniversary of the founder of the institution, Shikshanmaharshi Dr. Bapuji Salunkhe. The participatory role of the management encourages and sustains the involvement of the college faculties and staff, which is necessary for the efficient and effective functioning of the college.

The Principal is the academic and administrative head of the Institution, and he bears the ultimate responsibility for the smooth functioning of the College. He plans the academic and administrative calendars, co-curricular, extra-curricular and cultural activities in the beginning of the academic year by forming various committees of the faculties and non-teaching staff. He also maintains good relationships with the stakeholders for the development of the college. He promotes the relevant timely trainings, workshops, gatherings, meets for faculties and staff, which, in turn, result in quality education, commitment and accountability of all teaching and non-teaching staff. He promotes and maintains research environment in the institution by encouraging the faculties to undertake major/minor research projects. He implements effectively the co-curricular, extra-curricular and extension activities to develop the students' personality. The Principal also provides opportunities for relevant and timely training for the faculty and staff to enable them to upgrade their subject knowledge. The personal interactions of the Principal with various stakeholders play an important role in the institutional functioning. He also looks after the feedbacks taken from the stakeholders, and guides accordingly to do needful.

For effective teaching-learning process, the faculty members prepare annual teaching plan and maintain academic diary. Our faculty members participate actively in the schemes of the UGC/other agencies, and various training programmes to keep in pace with the modern development in their respective areas. In teaching-learning process, the faculty use ICT to keep the students in tune with the modern techniques of teaching-learning. They also participate in the organization of workshops, seminars and conferences to enhance the quality of education.

Feedback responses are taken from the students, alumni, parents and the participants in seminars, workshops, conferences, etc. to remove lacunae, and improve the quality of

education. The MoUs and collaborations are made to explore more areas for the institute-industry linkage, industrial visits and campus interviews, and organization of National and International conferences.

#### 6.1.3 What is the involvement of the leadership in ensuring?

#### The policy statements and action plans for fulfillment of the stated mission

The Principal, as a leader of the college, conducts a meeting of all faculty members at the beginning of the academic year. The academic calendar is prepared under the guidance of the Principal in consultation with the Heads of the departments. The different committees are formed for smooth functioning of the college. Continuous improvement in the academic process is ensured through participation and organization of seminars/ conferences/ workshops, motivating the faculty members to undertake MRPs, development in infrastructure, guiding the students to participate in various activities.

## • Formulation of action plans for all operations and incorporation of the same into the institutional strategic plan

Formulation of the action plans for all operations and incorporation is decided in the year-end meeting. The Principal forms various committees at the beginning of every academic year. All the departments and committees prepare their action plan along with the academic calendar which is to be implemented. If a new course is to be started, its proposal is submitted in the previous year and required infrastructure is made available. The Principal monitors the progress of the action plan. For proper implementation, the views of faculty members, student representatives, parents, and other stakeholders are taken into consideration.

#### • Interaction with stakeholders

The Principal makes conscious efforts to build a healthy relationship with its stakeholders. The monitoring committees are formed for every program which take care of every student from admission to appearing for final the annual examination.

#### **Students:**

The Principal holds frequent meetings with the Students' Council to understand their problems and to interact with them, as per requirement. In the beginning of every academic year, the Principal addresses the Part-I students to introduce the college. He also encourages the students to participate in various activities, competitions, sports, NSS and NCC. A suggestion box is placed in the college campus, and after analyzing the suggestions of the students, a proper action is taken by the Principal. Various Committees are formed for the benefit of the students; even the students can directly interact with the Principal. The Students are felicitated at annual college prize distribution function.

#### Alumni:

There is an active Alumni of the college. Some alumni serving in the college are a bridge between the alumni and the Principal. The suggestions from the alumni are considered for amplifying the overall college development by the Principal.

#### **Parents:**

Parent-teacher meets are organized by the college regularly to communicate their wards' performance and to understand their views regarding the progress of their wards and college. The parents' suggestions are always welcomed for the healthy development of the

students and institution. Parents can directly interact with the Principal and teachers whenever they want.

#### **Teaching and Non-teaching staff:**

The Principal as an active leader of the college considers that the college should be run as a team work. He also thinks that teaching and non-teaching staff are not working under him but with him. He greets the staff on special days which creates healthy atmosphere in the college. The staff is also felicitated for their achievements on the Independence Day and Republic Day of India and at annual prize distribution function. The Principal motivates the faculty members to undertake research activities.

#### **Industry and Other Organizations:**

The Principal makes conscious efforts to create network and collaborations with various organizations. There are 12 MoUs/collaborations between the college and other organizations. It also helps to design the curriculum and to increase the students' placements. He also promotes for the industrial tours to help the students for their overall development.

#### **Society:**

Through the extension activities with NSS, NCC, and interaction with media, the Principal strengthens a relationship between the college and society. The activities like vermi-culturing have proved beneficial to the society. The national programmes like Voters Day, Swachya Bharat Abhiyan, International Yoga Day, etc. are actively organized for the benefit of the society.

## • Proper support for policy and planning through need analysis, research inputs and consultations with the stakeholders

After analyzing the needs and suggestions of the stakeholders, the management and the principal formulate a new plan of action for the academic growth of the college.

#### • Reinforcing the culture of excellence

Our leadership promotes a culture of excellence at every level. Faculty Development Workshops, Lead College activity programmes and Guest lectures are organized with the guidance of the Principal, to keep the faculty and students up to date of the recent trends in teaching, learning and evaluation, and their specialized area of interest, thereby reinforcing a culture of excellence. As an institution moving towards paperless governance, most of the communications are sent to the Departments and Centres through e-mail and sms. The college website is updated with recent information, whenever necessary.

#### • To champion organizational change

Leadership is always vigilant in observing the changes in the global academic scenario, updating the programmes and facilities accordingly. Commencement of new courses, research activities, use of computer and internet facilities, ICT enabled class room teaching are some of the examples. Changes in the existing rules and regulations are brought after a discussion in the LMC based on the needs of the present generation. The COCs/COPs have been introduced in the college taking into consideration the recent interests of the stakeholders.

# 6.1.4 What are the procedures adopted by the institution to monitor and evaluate policies and plans of the institution for effective implementation and improvement from time to time?

The institution monitors the effective implementation of plans through the LMC, IQAC and periodic review meetings and interactions with the faculties, students and parents. All the activities are monitored by the Principal, H.O.Ds. and Coordinators. The review of the annual planning is taken periodically by the Principal, and the feedback mechanism is used to monitor and for improvement. The faculty members maintain their academic diaries which also help in implementation of the academic planning effectively. The Principal takes in detail the survey of the activities conducted in the term-end meetings.

## 6.1.5 Give details of the academic leadership provided to the faculty by the top management.

The Management is in constant touch with the Principal and gives enlightened leadership for the smooth functioning of the college. The management gives representation to the teaching and non-teaching staff on various committees of the management like the Managing Council, Transfer and Promotion Committee, etc. The management also appoints the staff members on the panel for the Academic and Administrative Audit (AAA) of the colleges. The management gives academic and administrative autonomy to the Principal. The faculty members and students are felicitated for their remarkable achievements on the occasion of the Death Anniversary of the founder of the parent institution on 8th August every year by the management.

#### 6.1.6 How does the college groom leadership at various levels?

#### **Student Leadership:**

The student leadership is mainly groomed through the Students' Council of the college. The NSS, NCC and Sports departments of the college provide ample opportunities in grooming leadership. The programmes organized by these departments empower the students with the leadership qualities. The students are also encouraged to participate in the university, state, regional level competitions like quiz, elocution, debate, youth festival, etc. in which their leadership qualities are developed.

#### **Faculty Leadership:**

The management always encourages involvement of the faculty members in the quality assurance and enhancement process of the institution. Various members are involved in the academic and administrative committees of the college such as Building Committee, Advisory Committee, Discipline Committee, Examination Committee, etc. by the Principal. All the committees are constituted with a judicious combination of young talent and experienced members so that the younger faculty can learn the ethos and work culture of the college as the prospective leaders.

#### **Training Programmes:**

The Principal, administrative staff and coordinators of various committees are encouraged to participate in leadership training programmes organized by the state, national and international organizations. The faculty members are motivated to organize different programmes through which the leadership qualities are developed.

# 6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments/units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

The college is sensitized to latest managerial concepts like strategic planning, teamwork, decision-making and computerization. The administration is decentralized to a large extent. Various committees have been formed to plan and monitor the functioning of

different departments of the college. The Principal with the support of Heads of the Departments and various committees, takes decision which creates an environment of organizational participatory democracy. Administrative powers and responsibilities are delegated to the faculties on the basis of their experience, competence, commitment and aptitude to meet the institutional objectives.

## 6.1.8 Does the college promote a culture of participative management? If yes, indicate the levels of participative management.

Yes. The college promotes a culture of participative management at different levels. For the smooth and effective functioning, the college forms the Local Management Committee which consists of the representatives of the stakeholders. The annual planning is finalized in consultation with the LMC. All decisions are taken considering the views of the Heads of the departments and coordinators. Appropriate financial allocations are made on priority basis on various schemes. The Students' Council meetings are called in order to take decisions and to plan any programme. Even the suggestions from the alumni, parents and representatives from society and industry are also welcomed as they are the members in various committees.

#### **6.2 Strategy Development and Deployment**

## 6.2.1 Does the Institution have a formally stated quality policy? How is it developed, driven, deployed and reviewed?

Yes, the institution has formally stated quality policies. Our policies are stated in the visions and missions of the college. While developing the mechanism for quality improvement, the views of the stakeholders are taken into consideration, and various committees are formed for the execution of the decisions taken. The job-oriented, career-oriented and applied subjects are introduced at the UG and PG level. The faculties and non-teaching staff are encouraged to participate in various activities/programmes to update their knowledge and skills, and necessary technological support is provided to them. Excellence is the watchword in all areas of curricular, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities in the college. The management has established a mechanism by which the Academic and Administrative Audit (AAA) of the college is undertaken every year. The AAA Panel makes suggestions for the improvement based on the SWOC analysis, and in the next visit of the committee, it is reviewed whether the suggestions have been implemented or not by the college.

Yes. The institution has prepared a perspective plan for development. - 5. Requirements of industry.



On an average the above committees meet twice a year. The decisions are taken in the meetings of the respective bodies, and their execution is monitored by the Principal, and the review of the work done is taken in the term-end and year-end meetings.

## 6.2.4 Give a broad description of the quality improvement strategies of the institution for each of the following:

#### ■ Teaching & Learning:

The college prepares the academic and administrative calendars well in advance before the commencement of the academic year. Every faculty prepares academic plan and maintains the academic diary for quality improvement. The teaching-learning process is supported by the use of ICT. The college organizes and encourages the faculty to participate and present papers in various seminars, conferences, and workshops regularly. The Departments organize seminars, projects, field visits, educational tours, group discussions, demonstrations, guest lectures, etc. for the students. The faculties are motivated to prepare resource material for teaching-learning. The college deputes the faculty to attend Orientation/Refresher courses, and training programmes to update their knowledge. The college also makes enrichment of library and laboratories with the support of various funding agencies. There is a talent search scheme for advanced learners to enhance their performance through paper solution exercises, and a remedial coaching scheme for the slow learners. The feedbacks are taken from the stakeholders for improvement in teaching-learning process. The college has made MoUs/Collabortions/Linkages with various 12 organizations. Under the skill development programme, the college has introduced 04 COCs. The meritorious students are felicitated by giving cash prizes.

#### Research & Development:

For quality improvement, the college has established Research Committee to promote research activities. The faculties are encouraged to undertake MRPs, to present and publish research papers/articles, and to participate in various seminars/conferences/workshops at international/ national /regional level. The college also organizes seminars/ conferences/ workshops at national, state and regional levels every year. The Ph.D. holder faculties are motivated to become research guides. INFLIBNET facility is provided in the college library to promote research environment. The college publishes its own biannual "MY COLLEGE BULLETIN" to circulate activities taking place in the college. To enhance research culture, the college has made MoUs/Collaborations/Linkages with various organizations. The researchers are felicitated for their achievements.

#### Community engagement:

The college makes conscious efforts for the community engagement in quality improvement by organizing extension activities through NSS, NCC, and cultural activities, alumni association, Jagarjanivancha and Yuva Jagar Abhiyan, and various outreach programmes. There is representation of community on the committees like IQAC, LMC, NSS, Internal Complaints Committee, etc. The college also allows utilizing college facilities

by the GOs, NGOs, and community at large. Organization of various days like Swacha Bharat Abhiyan on 2nd Oct. and Yoga Day on 21st June, etc. to inculcate cultural, health, and ethical values. Collaborative activities like AIDs and Voters' Awareness Programmes, Save the Baby Girl Campaign, etc. are organized for the community engagement.

#### • Human resource management:

The college has a very effective mechanism for human resource management. The administration is decentralized through functional freedom to HOD's, coordinators, and chairpersons of various committees. The available human resource is utilized by engaging them in annual and special committees for the organization of various activities/programmes. The college seeks feedback from its stakeholders to evaluate the performance of its human resource. Faculty and staff development programmes are also organized to update the knowledge base and pedagogical skills.

#### • Industry interaction:

The college has a firm belief that for the quality improvement, industry interaction is most significant. So the college has made 12 MoUs/Collaborations/Linkages with various organizations. Industrial training programmes are organized to provide practical orientation to UG and PG students and prepare them for career in the industries. The college gives an opportunity of hands-on-training to the students. For the industry interaction, industrial tours and field visits are organized. Through activities of the Placement Cell and Entrepreneurship Development Programme, the college-industry network is strengthened.

# 6.2.5 How does the Head of the institution ensure that adequate information (from feedback and personal contacts etc.) is available for the top management and the stakeholders, to review the activities of the institution?

The Head of the institution ensures that adequate information is available for the top management and the stakeholders in the following ways:

- By holding periodical meetings to review the activities undertaken and the overall progress of the college.

- Feedback collected through structured proforma and suggestion boxes to seek information and to take necessary measures for quality improvement.
- During the frequent visits of the Office bearers of the top management, the Principal provides necessary information to review the activities of the college.
- The college gives wide publicity to the activities through media, the college news bulletin **MY COLLEGE BULLETIN** and the college website.

6.2.8 Does the affiliating university make a provision for according the status of autonomy to an affiliated institution? If "yes", what are the efforts made by the institution in obtaining autonomy?

Yes, Shivaji University, Kolhapur has a provision for according the status of autonomy. The institute is making all the possible attempts for getting the autonomous status.

6.2.9 How does the Institution ensure that grievances / complaints are promptly attended to and resolved effectively? Is there a mechanism to analyze the nature of grievances for promoting better stakeholder relationship?

The institute has a Grievance Redressal Cell headed by the Principal. Prompt and effective disposal of grievances of various stakeholders is being done by the Grievances

Redressal Committee constituted for the overall well-being of the staff and students. This committee discusses the matter with the Principal to solve the problems. Suggestion boxes have been installed in the college campus and hostels in which the stakeholders put, in writing, their grievances. For the women, there is a separate committee named "Discipline Committee" to redress their grievances. The LMC, Students' Council, Discipline Committee, and Anti-ragging Committee also look after overall discipline of the college and resolve complaints, if any.

# 6.2.10 During the last four years, had there been any instances of court cases filed by and against the institute? Provide details on the issues and decisions of the courts on these?

No, there is no court case filed by or against the institute.

# 6.2.11 Does the Institution have a mechanism for analyzing student feedback on institutional performance? If yes, what was the outcome and response of the institution to such an effort?

The college has a clearly set and defined mechanism of obtaining the feedback from the students to improve the performance of the college. Feedback regarding the performance of the teachers and staff is collected from the last year students of all subjects and analyzed by the Principal, and necessary suggestions are given to the respective persons. The suggestions of the students are also collected through the suggestion boxes.

#### **Outcome of Feedback:**

- a) There was a demand from the P.G. students for additional reference books, so the books are made available in the department as well as in the college library.
- b) Broad band connectivity, reading room facility in the evening and reprography facilities are provided to the students in the college library as per their demand.
- c) Audio system in the class rooms is demanded by the students, which is fulfilled.
- d) A separate hall is developed as Competitive Examination Center.
- e) A separate well furnished Ladies' Room is made available for the female students.

#### **6.3 Faculty Empowerment Strategies**

## 6.3.1 What are the efforts made by the institution to enhance the professional development of its teaching and non-teaching staff?

Updating of knowledge base and skills is not only desirable but also imperative to face the challenges in the academic field. The college ensures the professional development of the faculty and staff by

- Motivating to organize and participate in the conferences, seminars, workshops, and skill-enhancing programmes.
- Encouraging to attend the orientation/refresher programmes, and short-term courses.
- Organizing guest lectures.
- Motivating to apply for major and minor research projects, career-oriented courses to nurture professional developments.
- Encouraging to take research activities by granting the study leaves, providing financial assistance, infrastructure and library facilities.
- Felicitation of the teaching and non-teaching staff for their achievements.
- ICT training programme through the Dept. of Comp. Sci., the broadband internet connectivity for teaching and non-teaching staff.

# 6.3.2 What are the strategies adopted by the institution for faculty empowerment through training, retraining and motivating the employees for the roles and responsibility they perform?

The college has perceived the need for enabling its faculty to use ICT tools to create richer learning environment and also improve curriculum delivery. The teaching and non-teaching staff is given training of ICT by the Department of Computer Science. The workshops on the newly framed syllabi of Shivaji University are arranged and the faculty members are also encouraged to actively participate in such workshops. The faculties are motivated to organize and attend workshops/seminars/conferences, etc., and they are also motivated to participate in the staff academic programmes. The college motivates the faculty members to undertake examination works of Shivaji University, Kolhapur. The senior members are given responsibilities as HODs, Co-ordinators and convenors of different committees, CAP directors, etc. Training on use of salary software for office staff has been given.

The college attempts to organize every year national/state level seminars/conferences. Special financial assistance is given for the paper presenters in the seminars/conferences. So far, 03 major and 27 minor research projects (MRPs) have been undertaken during the last five years.

# 6.3.3 Provide details on the performance appraisal system of the staff to evaluate and ensure that information on multiple activities is appropriately captured and considered for better appraisal.

The performance of faculty is monitored through performance based appraisal system as per the guidelines of UGC. Every faculty has to submit performance based appraisal forms to the IQAC at the end of each academic year. The Principal analyzes the reports giving his remarks and shares his views with the individuals for better performance. For the CAS, the performance based appraisal reports are taken into consideration for promotions.

# 6.3.4 What is the outcome of the review of the performance appraisal reports by the management and the major decisions taken? How are they communicated to the appropriate stakeholders?

Through the appraisals and evaluation, the Principal advises the faculty members for further improvement. On the basis of analysis of performance appraisal report, the individual is informed accordingly, and motivated for publishing articles, presenting papers, participating in workshops and conferences and to take up higher studies. Performance of nonteaching staff is evaluated on the basis of feedback from the Registrar and accordingly the Principal takes appropriate measures for necessary improvement and their confidential reports (CRs) are submitted to the management.

The outcome of the system is that the persons are identified to assign additional responsibilities and those who are not contributing significantly in the development of the college are informed to make necessary improvements in their performance. Then, the Principal communicates the results of the analysis of the appraisal reports to the stakeholders.

## 6.3.5 What are the welfare schemes available for teaching and non teaching staff? What percentage of staff have availed the benefit of such schemes in the last four years?

The welfare schemes available for teaching and non-teaching staff are

• Financial assistance/loans for various reasons by the credit society of the employees of the management.

- Concession in college fees for the wards of the employees.
- Felicitation by the management for achievements of the employees and their wards.
- Free computer awareness training for the employees.
- Deputation of faculties and staff for competence building programmes/FIP.
- In emergency, advance amount is given to the teaching and non-teaching staff.
- Fund raising drive for the employee affected by an unforeseen calamity.
- Share of the EPF is borne by the college.
- Group life insurance for teaching and non-teaching staff under the parent university scheme.

The benefits of these schemes are availed by more than 50 % of the eligible employees.

## 6.3.6 What are the measures taken by the Institution for attracting and retaining eminent faculty?

The following measures are taken by the college for attracting and retaining eminent faculty member:

- Eminent, sincere and deserving employees are given large service tenure in the college ensuring more stability.
- Constant up-gradation of laboratories, libraries and other infrastructural facilities.
- Cordial and healthy relationship between the employees and management.
- Transparency in administration.
- Excellent research-oriented academic environment.
- Organization and participation in international, national, state and regional level activities.
- Availability of large number of courses/programmes.
- Co-operation from the administration for vertical mobility of employees.
- Reputation earned by the college.

#### 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

## 6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

Every year, the budget, prepared by the college and sanctioned by the IQAC and LMC, is submitted to the management for its approval. Then, the available funds are distributed according to the needs of the departments. Expenditure is made with the prior permission of the Principal/management in black and white. Quotations are invited and opened before the purchase committee, and accordingly purchase orders are placed. All the official formalities are completed; viz. preparation of vouchers/stock entry and issue of cheques to the concerned suppliers, and the record is maintained. Receipts for all the collections are given and the amount is deposited in banks.

The college has internal and external audit mechanism to monitor the utilization of the budget effectively and efficiently. The utilization of the budget is monitored regularly by the management. Separate ledgers are maintained under different heads.

# 6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

The college has internal and external audit mechanism. The internal audit is carried out by the Auditor of the management. The external audit is carried out by the Joint Director of Higher Education, the Senior Auditor and the Auditor General of the State.

The last audit was done on 31/07/2014 by the Govt. approved auditor, and there were no major audit objections. The AG audit by the Auditor General, Mumbai was done on 31/03/2010, there were 07 audit objections and all the 07 objections are cleared by the college.

## 6.4.4 Give details on the efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and the utilization of the same (if any).

The college devises various ways and means to mobilize the resources for the welfare of the college. Some of the methods used to secure additional funding are

- Donations from the local NGO/Political Parties e.g. The Rastravadi Congress Party of Tasgaon has given Rs.4,28,000/- for students.
- Financial assistance from funding agencies like UGC, DST, NAAC, etc.

Additional financial assistance is sought from the UGC and DST for MRPs, Infrastructure, Conferences, COC Grants, etc. From the DST the FIST and Major Research Project Grant are received.

#### **6.5 Internal Quality Assurance System (IQAS)**

#### **6.5.1 Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)**

# a. Has the institution established an Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC)? If yes, what is the institutional policy with regard to quality assurance and how has it contributed in institutionalizing the quality assurance processes?

Yes, IQAC has been actively functioning in the college. The college has entrusted the responsibility of planning, monitoring and executing different activities to the IQAC for quality assurance and sustenance focusing on the core values identified by the NAAC.

The quality assurance processes have been institutionalized through:

- Disseminating information on the various quality parameters of higher education.
- Reviewing the existing programmes and introducing new age programmes relevant to the present educational scenario.
- Promoting research and creating atmosphere conducive to research.
- Promoting the use of technology for enhanced teaching learning process.

- Organization of national, state, regional level seminars/ conferences/workshops.
- Inculcating nationalistic/ patriotic sentiments.
- Imparting value-based education.
- Documenting the various quality enhancing programmes/activities of the college.
- Collecting the feedback responses from the students, parents and other stakeholders.

The IQAC prepares an AQAR report of the college and submits to the NAAC every year.

## b. How many decisions of the IQAC have been approved by the management / authorities for implementation and how many of them were actually implemented?

The management approved all decisions of the IQAC.

## c. Does the IQAC have external members on its committee? If so, mention any significant contribution made by them.

Yes, the IQAC has external members on its committee. They are from the fields of academics and industry.

#### d. How do students and alumni contribute to the effective functioning of the IQAC?

The students, and alumni coming from all strata of society contribute to the functioning of IQAC with their valuable suggestions made during their interactions with the Principal and Coordinator of the IQAC. They give active support to implement the decisions taken by the IQAC. As a mark of respect and gratitude, they render valuable services to the college by instituting scholarships, and working as guest lecturers.

## e. How does the IQAC communicate and engage staff from different constituents of the institution?

The IQAC communicates the staff through notices, messages, e-mails, and various meetings conducted from time to time. The IQAC meetings are conducted for planning and implementation of quality enhancement measures and the decisions taken are communicated to the staff and students for effective execution. Proper persons are identified to shoulder different responsibilities. Various committees of the teachers and non-teaching staff provide assistance to the IQAC. In this way, the IQAC engages the staff from different constituents of the college for its efficient functioning.

## 6.5.2 Does the institution have an integrated framework for Quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities? If yes, give details on its operationalization.

Yes, the college has an integrated framework for quality assurance of the academic and administrative activities. The IQAC plays a major role in quality assurance in the college. The quality measures are decided in the meeting of the IQAC organized in the end of the previous year and implemented accordingly throughout the next academic year. For the effective functioning of academic and administrative activities, various committees are constituted in the beginning of the academic year to implement the quality measures decided by the IQAC. For the quality assurance and sustenance, the academic and administrative calendars are published before the commencement of the academic year. The faculties maintain academic diaries to record their academic, co-curricular, extracurricular and extension activities. The Principal takes reviews of the implementation of the activities in the

meetings with the faculty and non-teaching staff as well as in personal interactions with the staff, whenever necessary.

The college has a work culture of working beyond the working hours. Our belief is that our college is a family called Vivekananda Parivar which motivates us to work as a team. The management has also institutionalized the internal Academic and Administrative Audit (AAA) of the college by the panel of peers to ensure quality assurance and sustenance.

## 6.5.3 Does the institution provide training to its staff for effective implementation of the Quality assurance procedures? If yes, give details enumerating its impact.

Yes, the college provides training to its staff for quality assurance procedures. Institutional level workshops, lectures by eminent speakers and awareness programmes are organized by the college. For competence building, the college conducts training programmes like use of softwares, and ICT for the staff. They are also deputed for the training in accounts and other related matters.

# 6.5.4 Does the institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If yes, how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

Yes, the college undertakes academic audit by the management every year and by the university after every three years. The external review of academic provisions is also taken by the various university committees, as and when is required by them.

The management has an independent body called Vidya Samiti (the Academic Cell) which conducts academic and administrative audit (AAA) of the college by appointing the panel of peers. These panel makes certain suggestions based on SWOC analysis which are used to improve the institutional performance.

The outcome of this practice resulted into shortlisting of the college the college for the CPE status by UGC. The students, of the college securing number of Shivaji University Merit Scholarships continuously for the last 03 years. The number of MRPs has been increased along with the Ph.D. holders and participants in the research activities like presentation and publication of research papers/articles. The organization of seminars, conferences, workshops sponsored by various agencies has become a regular practice. The number of COCs and MOUs has also increased.

# 6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

At the apex of the institutional mechanism to continuously review the teaching-learning process is the Principal, followed by the IQAC. The HoDs and the Coordinators of various committees support this mechanism.

The mechanism begins with the analysis of university results, and it followed by inspection of the academic diary of the faculty members by the Principal every month, observing whether the activities are conducted as per the Academic Calendar, submission of syllabus completion report at the end of every semester, feedback from the stakeholders, meetings with the stakeholders by the Principal, and regular monitoring by the HoDs and Time Table Committee Incharge regarding the regular conduct of classes.

The impact of these measures is reflected in the improvement in the university results, increase in number of meritorious students, increase in the strength of the students, performance in the cultural, sports, and extension activities. There has been substantial increase in the growth in the funding received from various agencies which resulted in the enrichment of library, up-gradation of laboratories, and increase in the number of COCs and other courses.

## 6.5.7 How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

The college communicates its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcome to the various internal and external stakeholders through the college website, display boards, the college prospectus, formal meetings and personal interctions with the stakeholders, notices, reports of activities in college annual "SANSKAR", print and electronic media, and addresses in the college activities/programmes.

#### **CRITERIA VII**

#### INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES

#### 7.1 Environment Consciousness

#### 7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

Environment consciousness is the mission of the college and trees plantation is a major concern to maintain the pristine purity and beauty of the college to provide good atmosphere for the academic and non-academic pursuits.

Yes. The College conducts a Green Audit of its campus and facilities. Green audit of the campus is carried out by the Department of Botany and Department of Zoology periodically by using the available expertise.

#### 7.1.2 What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus eco-friendly?

Supervision and the maintenance of existing trees and locating places for planting new trees is the issue of top priority. The barren land on which the college is situated is converted into a heaven of flora and fauna. Thus, lots of efforts are taken to make the campus environment-friendly. The unique feature of the plantation drive is the students' initiative. Most of the plants are planted and adopted by the students. The plantation drive is divided as Students' Park, Alumni's park, NCC park and Sports Persons' Park.

#### **Energy conservation**

Minimal consumption of energy is the saving factor of energy conservation in the campus. Notices near switch boards prevent wastage of energy. The use of CFL bulbs instead of tungsten lamps, using open stage for college level functions in pleasant whether reduces energy consumption. Classrooms are made with sufficient cross ventilation and light so that use of electricity can be minimized.

#### Use of renewable energy

Though solar panels are installed in women hostel, the college is planning to install solar panels throughout the campus. Bathing water in the hostel is reused for watering the trees. Drip irrigation system is used in the garden.

#### Water harvesting

The rain water harvesting is implemented in the new buildings that are under construction. The rain water from the college campus is collected through percolation to raise ground water level. Percolation of rain water is also done by paving block flooring.

#### **Check dam construction**

Every year a 7 days residential camp of the NSS is organized at an adopted village. Every the NSS students construct a check dam at the village river for storage of water. This is joint a venture of NSS, Grampanchayat and the Government officers.

#### **Efforts of Carbon neutrality**

The college campus is plastic –polythene free zone which makes the campus eco-friendly. The dead leaves and waste papers are not allowed to put on fire .The leaves are buried in soil and papers are disposed off. Recently we have taken PUC of the all four wheelers and two wheelers of the staff members and almost of all the students. In the laboratories, LPG fuel is used to reduce carbon content. Planting a variety of trees has contributed to carbon neutrality.

#### **Plantation**

The green ambience of the college is largely due to trees plantation. There are about more than five hundred of trees of various kinds in the campus. Trees have covered nearly one third of college area so that ecosystem is maintained. Several plantation drives are undertaken under different titles as Alumni's Park, Women's Park and Sport Persons' Park. The planted trees are now established well and the have grown very tall and broad.

#### Hazardous waste management

Hazardous waste from science laboratories is managed safely. Animal waste from Zoological laboratory is buried in soil at a protected zone. Chemical wastes are properly disposed by dissolving in water .Exhaust fans are installed in laboratories to exhaust gases. Other wastes in the campus are collected in dust bins. Enough number of dust bins are kept in the campus.

#### e-waste management

Electronic goods are put to optimum use. The minor repairs are set right by the staff and laboratory assistants and major repairs by the professional technicians and are reused. When they fall out of use, they are handed over to the agent of suppliers of electronic equipments.

#### **Others**

#### 1. Slogan boards in campus

Slogan boards regarding environmental consciousness, energy conservation, use of renewable energy, importance of carbon neutrality , plantation are displayed in the campus to create awareness .

#### 2. Drip irrigation system

College gardens are watered by using drip irrigation system to save water.

#### 3. Green project

The green ambience of the college is largely due to trees plantation. There are about more than five hundred trees of various kinds in the campus. Trees have covered nearly one third of the college area so that ecosystem is maintained. Students of Chemistry have been made aware by allotting them the projects relating to "Green Chemistry" for the last five years. Several plantation drives are undertaken under different titles as Alumni's Park, Women's Park and Sport Persons' Park. The planted trees are now established well and they have grown very tall and broad.

#### 7.2 INNOVATIONS

## 7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last five years which have created a positive impact on the functioning of the college

Innovations made in the academic and related activities speak of the progress of the college in leaps and bounds. The details of the innovations are as below:

#### A) Academic innovations:

- 2. Allotting research projects to the students for understanding the importance the research.
- 3. Organizing an unique research-oriented activity for all the students entitled "NEW HORIZON."

The college is trying to prepare the students for global standard research. Keeping in mind the same perspective, the college has been running a very unique and innovative research based program for students called 'NEW HORIZON' for the last four years. Every year more than 100 original research articles are presented in the program.

4. Participation of students in National level research competitions. Many of the students of our college are participating in national level competitions like "BIOCOMP." A national level research competitions organized by the Shivaji University, Kolhapur in 2014.

#### C) Creating Innovative Writing Skills among Faculty and Students:

The college publishes its news bulletin twice in a year entitled 'MY COLLEGE BULLETIN' to publicize the college activities. The students of

our college have a potential of writing skills. For the last two years the students of Arts faculty have been publishing on special moments a Marathi bulletin <u>YUVA SPANDAN</u> and <u>UVA AVISHKAR</u> occasionally. For the last many years some of the science departments have been publishing annual compendium as <u>CHEMVISION</u> regularly of all the activities taking place in the year. Our faculty Prof. G. K. Patil (History) has been writing articles regularly in news papers and has published more than <u>150 timely articles till</u> this day. Our faculty from Marathi department Prof. B. K. Gosavi is engaged in writing songs and scripts for Marathi feature films which are well acknowledged.

#### **D)** Women Empowerment Initiatives:

The Govt. of Maharshtra launched a gender sensitization programme entitled <u>Jagar Janivancha</u> for women empowerment. Our college is very sensitive in women empowerment and has conducted many training and awareness programs for the female students.

Some of the activities are enlisted bellow:

- 1. Certificate Course 'Personality Development and Beauty Culture'- this is the unique short-term course organized for the female students by keeping following points in mind
- a. To develop overall personality and to support the short-term career development for the females.
- b. To develop awareness of soft-skills in female students.
- c. To improve personality development of female students. To introduce beauty culture especially for rural female students.
- d. To create an environment, where females can make independent decisions in their personal as well as social life.

# **E)** Sexual Harassment Prevention and Ladies Welfare Committee:

As per the guidelines of the Supreme Court and UGC, an Anti-Sexual Harassment Committee has been established by our institution to provide healthy and congenial atmosphere to the staff and students. The committee was constituted to meet the basic objectives:

- a. To develop the guidelines against sexual harassment.
- b. To develop awareness for prevention of sexual harassment, women's rights.
- c. To develop gender equality and to inspire the students to stand against social and domestic violence.

#### 7.3 Best Practices

They have explained these Laws by giving some real examples and experience regarding obstacles through her legal practice.

#### POST-ACCREDITATION INITIATIVES

The college went through the process of reaccreditation in 2010 in which the college acquired B Grade with CGPA 2.09. Now the college is going to face its 3rd cycle of accreditation in the year 2015-2016.

In view of the recommendations of the previous Peer Team, the college has taken the following initiatives to enhance the quality in teaching-learning process, research, sports, cultural and extension activities during the post-accreditation period.

- The college has submitted various proposals for seeking funds from various agencies to upgrade physical infrastructure, laboratories, library resources, ICT, sports facilities, research activities and office administration.
- The college has been shortlisted for the status of the College with Potential for Excellence (CPE) by the UGC. The college has received the BSR grants from the UGC in 2014-2015.
- The college has expanded its infrastructure by constructing a huge main building, new women's hostel, gymkhana buildings, laboratories, competitive examination center and construction of the concrete compound to the college campus area.
- The college attempts to organize a number of national seminars/conferences every year to enhance the knowledge base of the faculty members and students in their respective areas. During the last five years, the college has organized 05 national seminars/conferences on various topics as follows:

#### **National Seminars/Conferences Organized:**

- 1. 29<sup>th</sup> Annual Conference of Maharashtra Political Science & Public Administration Association (2 days- 7, 8 January 2012).
- 2. A National Conference on 'Frontiers in Chemical & Biological Sciences' (2 days -23, 24 September 2013).
- 3. A National Conference on 'Impact of Globalization own Indian Co-operative Movement (2 days- 25, 26 September 2013).
- 4. A State Level Conference on 'Role of Research, Consultancy and Extension in Higher Education' (29, 30 November 2013).
- 5. A National Conference on 'Changing Agricultural Pattern In Draught Prone Region' (23, 24 December 2014) .
- The faculties submitted a number of Minor and Major Research Project proposals to various funding agencies. During the last five years, 03 Major and 28 Minor Research Projects have been sanctioned. The total outlay of all the MRPs is near about Rs.80,00,000/-.
- The faculty members are is encouraged to present research papers in seminars and conferences by providing financial assistance.

- The college has organized workshops on the revised syllabi on different subjects in collaboration of the university and under the lead college activities for the students and teachers.
- The college has hosted various sports events.
- To enhance the competency in cultural events, the college has provided special guidance of experts, musical instruments, sound system and other material. The outcome of these efforts resulted in participation and various prizes at state/university cultural competitions during the last 5 years. The college cultural team has shown scintillating performance by winning a number of trophies, awards and cash prizes at the district, regional and state levels.
- The college has volunteered for the Academic and Administrative Audit (AAA) through the panel of external peers for its evaluation for further improvement.
- The college has started publishing its own multidisciplinary publications like the annual magazine "SANSKAR", students' publications as "YUVA SPANDAN" and "YUVA AVISHKAR." And a college bulletin named "MY COLLEGE BULLETIN."
- The college has taken initiative to make the website dynamic.
- The college has developed linkages with external organizations for MOUs' and collaborations. So far, 12 linkages are developed into formal MOUs. Because of this, the students get opportunity to have hands-on experience. The expertise of these organizations helped the college in various programmes.
- The college has installed a vigilance system with CCTV cameras and security guards to maintain discipline and better security.
- A lot of emphasis is given on ICT, and separate infrastructure has been made available for support services like NCC, NSS, Distance Education, YCMOU, IQAC.
- The college has introduced 04 COCs to develop different skills among the students and make them employable. The COCs introduced are
  - 1) Certificate Course in Travel and Tourism
  - 2) Certificate Course in Functional English
  - 3) Certificate Course in Human Rights Education
  - 4) P.G. Diploma In Human Rights Education
- The college has introduced many new UG programs which received overwhelming response from the students.
- The library computerization is in full swing with barcoding system for the library transactions. The library services are enriched with INFLIBNET for e-resources and addition of new textbooks, reference books and periodicals.
- The science departments have been encouraged to take intiatives to develop their departmental libraries.
- Separate computer laboratories for BCA & B.Sc. Computer Science, Statistics and Chemistry programme have been developed.
- The college has developed a separate Competitive Examination Center with all the required resources. It has helped in developing skills in Competitive Examinations.
- All the existing laboratories have been renovated and updated by adding modern equipments. The Chemistry, Botany, Zoology and Physics laboratories have been recognized as the research laboratories by Shivaji University, Kolhapur. The

- Department of Chemistry running M.Sc. programme in Organic Chemistry with increased intake from 20 to 40.
- The efforts have been taken to invite many organizations for campus interviews to strengthen placements of the students. During the last five years, a number of organizations like ICICI Bank, Patani Computers, Thermax visited the college for campus interviews.
- An International Conference is proposed at Dubai on November, 2015 in collaboration with Jagdamba Multipurpose Society.
- The college has organized Entrepreneurship Development activities through the department of Commerce to provide guidance to the students for self-employment.
- The college has encouraged the students to pariticipate in seminars, workshops in the college as well as in other institutions.
- The special programmes for women empowerment have been organized through participation in activities of Jagar Janivancha Campaign. Under this campaign, the Govt. of Maharashtra organized a competition for the colleges in the state.
- The college has carried out Gender analysis of the college for the last five years to understand and analyze the position of gender balance in the college, and accordingly the programmes have been arranged to orient towards gender disparity.
- Environment/Green Audit of the campus has been carried out in order to make college eco-friendly. The college has consciously made efforts to create awareness among the stakeholders about environment pollution.
- The college has made efforts to make campus eco-friendly by managing disposal of waste.
- A vermi culture unit has been developed to use the waste material to create biofertilizer.
- On the birthdays, of the teaching and non-teaching staff, they are given good wishes by the Principal with letters of greetings.
- The students are honored for their achievements by giving cash prizes at the Annual Prize Distribution Function.
- NSS and NCC units have been strengthened by organizing innovative activities and their participation in state and national activities. These units have acquired and bagged a number of awards at the district, state, and national levels.
- The college could take these initiatives and acquire all-round success due to the constant guidance, support and monitoring by the Management.
- The Principal has also succeeded in inculcating the principle of Team Work and working beyond working hours.
